#### **Executive Summary**

2004 was the second year of a 3-year electoral mandate given to the Council elected in December 2002 which consisted of;

Mayor Stewart Young Councillor Denise Blackwell Councillor Winnie Sifert Councillor John Goudy Councillor Lanny Seaton Councillor Lillian Szpak Councillor Matt Sahlstrom

The Standing Committee system continued for the eleventh year with significant continuity of citizen participation providing important community advise to Council. The contributions of volunteer citizens are much appreciated and are effective in providing a more informed participation of the Langford's citizens in the decision making process.

The highlight of 2004 was the opening of Bear Mountain Arena in February at the Juan de Fuca Recreation Centre in Colwood. City of Langford is the major municipal partner in that Recreation Centre. Bear Mountain Arena was built on time, on budget and has provided a wonderful 2,300 seat with an additional 600 standing room capacity recreation facility for the West Shore citizens.

A number of other major rezonings were completed in 2004 for the following developments.

Hull's Field on Jacklin Road;

Millstream East north of the McCallum Road;

120 room Sheriton Hotel rezoning on McCallum Road;

Oakcrest Park Estates rezoning for Lakeside on Langford Lake; and

Goldstream Meadows rezoning at the intersection of West Shore Parkway and Trans Canada Highway.

Council completed the land exchange with BLD Developments Isabel Avenue, Happy Valley Road. A new intersection was built at Bear Mountain Parkway with Millstream Road.

Council completed the Langford Sewer Partnering and Franchise Agreement with West Shore Environmental Services in September for the financing, design, build, own and operation of sewer infrastructure in Langford over the next 21 years. This is a wholly owned subsidiary of Terasen Utilities Services Inc. In return the City receives a franchise fee of \$3,600,000 in 2004, and receives \$15,000 annually equaling 5% of user fees and a royalty payment equaling 18% of sewer capital costs recovery fees each year over the life of the franchise. Overall it is expected that royalties will exceed \$11,000,000 revenue over the 21-year term of the Franchise Agreement. There is a 5-year rate freeze on user fees and a 5-year rate freeze on sewer capital recovery charges. Sewers are now built in a timely manner, there is no longer a need for sewer petitions or Sewer Specified Area Bylaws and construction priorities are agreed upon annually. West Shore now funds and finances all construction of sewers in Langford and sewer extensions for the next 21 years, freeing up the city's borrowing power for other infrastructure.

Happy Valley Elementary School fire was extinguished by the Langford Fire Department on October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2004. No one was hurt in the blaze but the school was destroyed. The cause of the fire was unknown.

2004 was another very busy year for the Planning Department, Building Department and Engineering Department, all having record activity years.

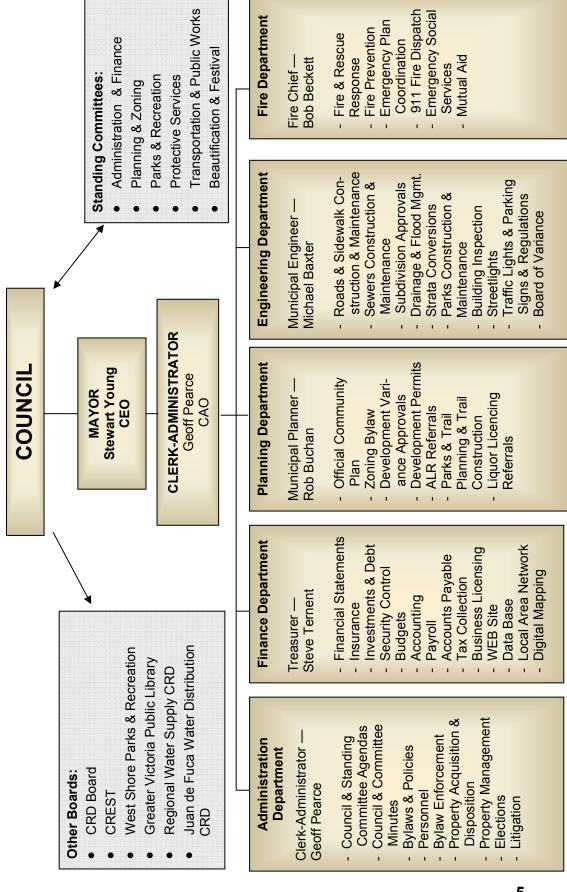

#### **2004 City of Langford Accomplishments**

#### 1. Administration Department:

 Langford completed two minor Boundary Extensions, one with Totangi Forest Products off Humpback Road, the second one, the realignment of the municipal boundary with the District of Highlands to accommodate the Bear Mountain Parkway.

#### Property Transaction

- i) The City sold a 2 acre hotel site to Starwood Holdings on McCallum Road for \$600,000 in June, Starwood Holdings also has an Option To Purchase the remaining 2 ½ acres next year.
- ii) The City purchased the new Fire Hall No 2 site in May at the corner of Happy Valley and Sooke Roads for \$300,000.
- The City exchanged property with BLD Developments in that area for the construction of new playing fields which will be completed by summer of next year.
- iv) The City purchased a home at 2765 Spencer for safety improvements to Spencer Road.

#### Council initiated:

i) Hotel Revitalization Tax Exemption Program: this is to provide 5-year tax exemption for new hotel improvements that started construction in 2004. As a result Council attracted two major new developments in Langford taking advantage of this incentive program; a new 120 room Sheriton Hotel and new 89 rooms Bear Mountain Club House Hotel.



• The City entered into a 21-year Franchise Partnering Agreement with West Shore Environmental Services to take over the operation and provide future expansion of Langford sewer collection system for the next 21 years with a 21 year option. This will provide stable sewer services to City residents at fixed prices for the first 5 years and with prices thereafter based on cost of living. It will also provide an assured long term source of municipal revenues in the form of royalty payments from West Shore Environmental Services to the City. Sewer royalty payment will bring in over \$10 million over the next 21 years.

#### 2. Finance Department:

- Implemented web-based Home Owner Grant Application, allowing 585 residents to claim their grant electronically;
- Received an award from Municipal Software for using CityView with staff, contractors and the public to increase the quality of service:
- Purchased and implemented SharePoint document management system;
- Established three public internet portal sites in downtown Langford;
- Participated in negotiation of sewer franchise and partnering agreement.

#### 3. Engineering Department:

- Obtained infrastructure grant for Goldstream Bridge \$240,000;
- Constructed red brick sidewalks on Peatt Road;
- Completed 21-year Franchise Partnership Agreement for sewer system with WestShore Environmental Services Inc.:
- Firehall Creek Drainage Improvements for flood abatement;
- Coordinate, supervision of numerous frontage improvements for new development.

#### 4. Building Inspection Department:

Building Inspection Department has issued Building Permits for a record \$69,000,000 of construction value in the
first eleven months. Including in this a record 177 new single family dwellings, a record of 199 multiple family
dwelling units, \$30,000,000 in commercial and industrial construction and more expected in the month of December

- No volunteer firefighter turn-over, resulting in no need to recruit in 2005;
- Langford Fire Rescue received a provincial award from the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada for its fund raising and public awareness campaigns;
- Plans are well underway for the replacement of Station #2; and
- Bear Mountain Development agrees to sprinkler all buildings in their development including single family units.

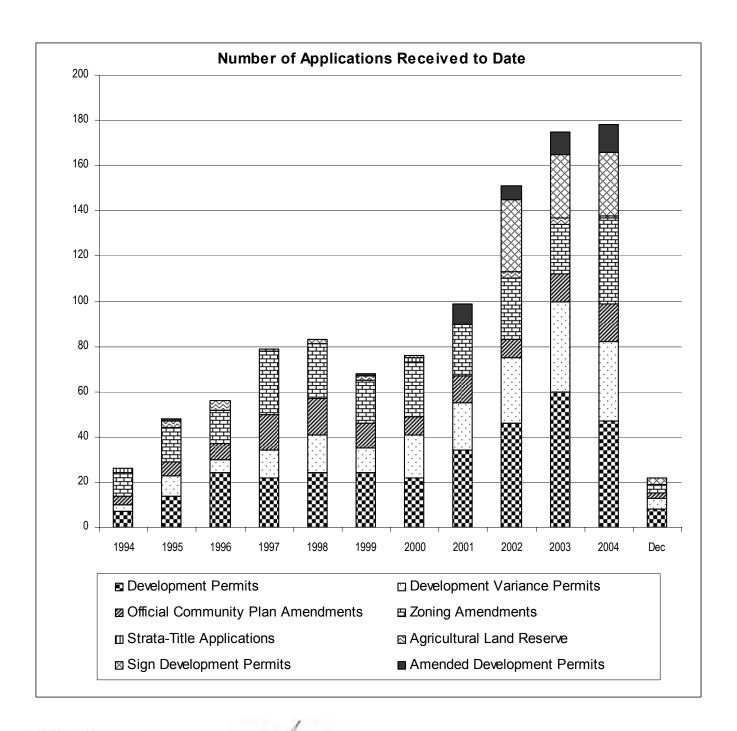

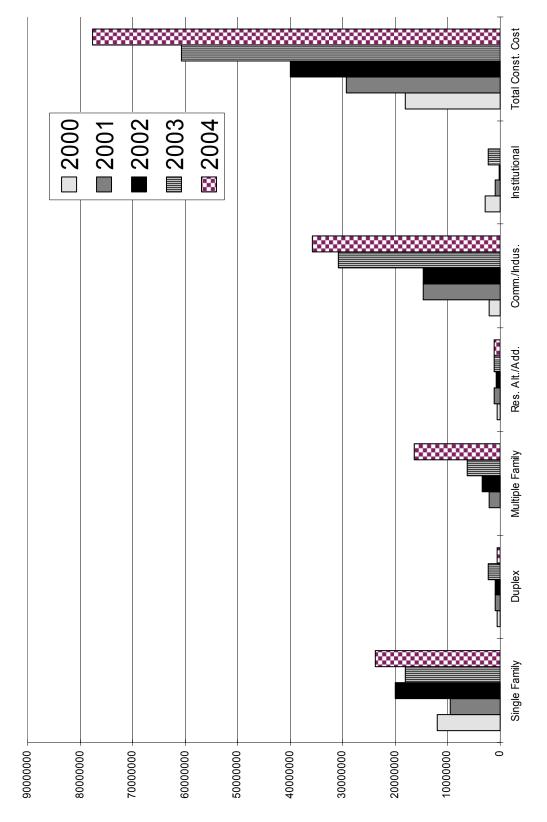

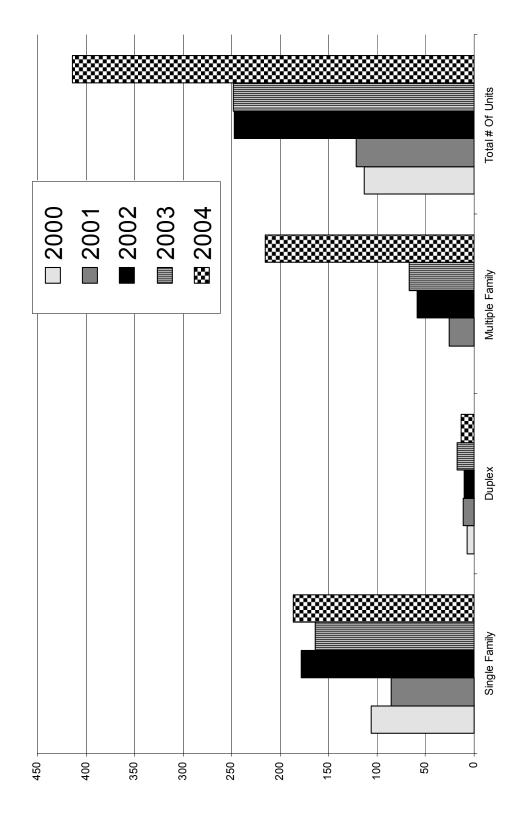

Construction Costs To Dec. 31, 2004



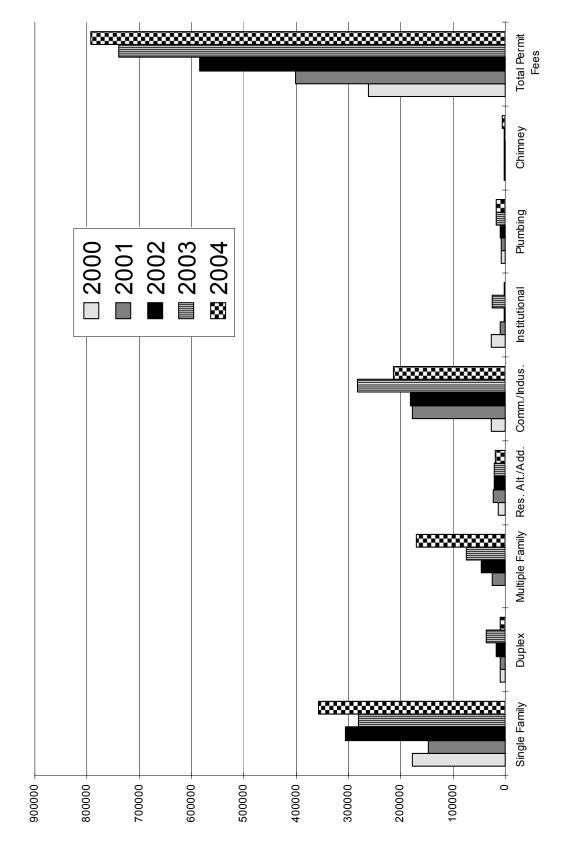

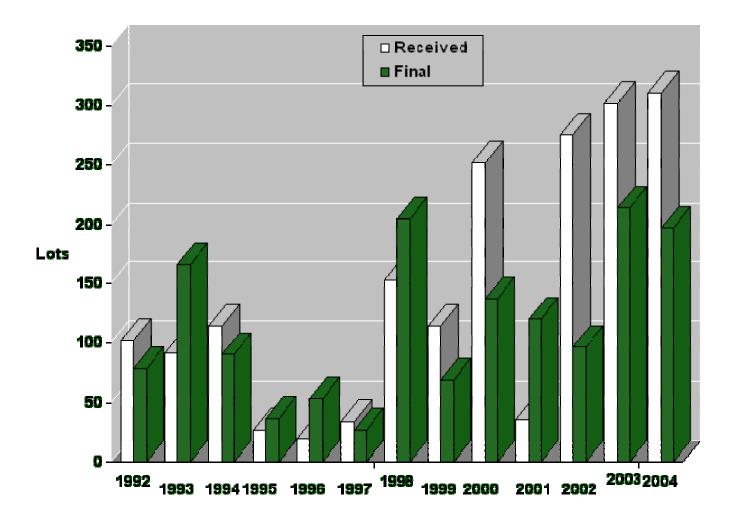

The City of Langford is incorporated under the provisions of the British Columbia Local Government Act.

## 1. Significant accounting policies:

The consolidated financial statements of the City of Langford (the "City") are prepared by management in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments, as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board ("PSAB") of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the City are as follows:

## (a) Reporting entity:

The consolidated financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances and in financial position of the reporting entity. Effective January 1, 2004, the financial statements also reflect the proportionate consolidation of the City's share of the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society. This change has been applied on a prospective basis (note 12).

## (b) Basis of accounting:

The basis of accounting followed in the consolidated financial statement presentation is an accrual basis and includes revenues in the period in which the transactions or events occurred that gave rise to the revenues and expenditures in the period the goods and services are acquired and a liability is incurred or transfers are due.

#### (c) Fund accounting:

Funds within the consolidated financial statements consist of the operating, capital, sewer and reserves funds. Transfers between funds are recorded as adjustments to the appropriate fund balance.

#### (d) Investments:

The investments are recorded at cost which approximates fair market value.

#### (e) Capital assets:

Capital assets acquired or constructed are recorded at cost as expenditures in the period they are acquired. Capital assets contributed from developers are reported at estimated cost.

Depreciation is not recorded on capital assets.

#### (f) Reserve for future expenditures:

Certain amounts, as approved by Council, are set aside in reserves for future operating and capital expenditures. Transfers to and/or from reserves are reflected as an adjustment to the respective fund.

## 1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

## (g) Equity in capital assets:

Equity in capital assets represents the investment in capital assets, after deducting the portion financed by related debt.

## (h) Government transfers:

Government transfers are recognized in the consolidated financial statements as revenues in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be made.

## (i) Deferred revenue:

Receipts, which are restricted by the legislations of the provincial or federal governments or by agreement with external parties, are deferred and reported as restricted revenues. When qualifying expenditures are incurred, restricted revenues are brought into revenue at equal amounts.

#### (i) Use of estimates:

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

## 3. Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia debt reserve fund deposits:

The Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia ("MFA") provides capital financing for regional districts and their member municipalities. The MFA is required to establish a Debt Reserve Fund. Each regional district through its member municipalities who share in the proceeds of a debt issue is required to pay into the Debt Reserve Fund certain amounts set out in the debt agreements. The MFA pays into the Debt Reserve Fund these monies from which interest earned thereon, less administrative expenses, becomes an obligation to the regional districts. It must then use this fund if, at any time, there are insufficient funds to meet payments on its obligations. When this occurs, the regional districts may be called upon to restore the fund.

Upon maturity of a debt issue, the unused portion of the Debt Reserve Fund established for that issue will be discharged to the City. The proceeds from these discharges will be credited to income in the year they are received. As at December 31, 2004, the total of the Debt Reserve Fund was \$527,595.

## 5. Deferred revenue - development cost charges:

This restricted revenue liability represents funds received from developers for capital expenditures. In accordance with the British Columbia Local Government Act, these funds must be deposited into a separate reserve fund. In accordance with PSAB recommendations, the City records development cost charges as deferred revenue. When the related costs are incurred, the development cost charges are then recognized as revenue.

#### 6. Debt:

#### (a) Short-term debt:

The short-term debt is comprised of \$140,000 MFA financing due in 2005, \$330,000 MFA interim financing, \$610,000 MFA interim financing and \$5,400,000 MFA interim financing, all at interest rates equal to Bank of Montreal 30-day banker's acceptance rates.

The City intends to repay the \$140,000 short-term debt in a single payment in 2005. The City intends to convert both the \$330,000 and the \$610,000 short-term debt to long-term debt to be repaid over 15 years. The City intends to convert the \$5,400,000 short-term debt to long term debt to be repaid over 20 years.

## 10. Commitments and contingencies:

#### (a) Contingent liabilities:

- (i) The City, as a member of the Capital Regional District, is jointly and severally liable for their net capital liabilities.
- (ii) The loan agreements with the MFA provide that if the MFA does not have sufficient funds to meet payments on its obligations, it shall make payments from the Debt Reserve Fund which, in turn, is established by a similar Debt Reserve Fund in the City and all other borrowing participants. If the Debt Reserve Fund is deficient, the MFA's obligations become a liability of the regional district and may become a liability of the participating municipalities.

## 10. Commitments and contingencies (continued):

(b) Litigation liability:

There are several lawsuits pending in which the City is involved. It is considered that the potential claims against the City resulting from such litigation will be covered by insurance and not materially affect the consolidated financial statements of the City.

## (c) Commitments:

- (i) The City entered into a long-term contract with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for the provision of police services effective October 1, 1994. Under the terms of this contract, the City is responsible for 90% of policing costs. The 2004 estimated cost of this contract is \$2,638,000.
- (ii) Effective for 2002, the City together with the other owners of the Juan de Fuca Recreation Complex entered into a five-year commitment with the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society for the operation and maintenance of the facilities. Annual commitments are apportioned to each municipality based on annual municipal converted assessment values. The City's commitment for 2005 is \$1,519,890.
- (iii) The City of Langford, City of Colwood and District of Highlands each held successful referenda in November 2002 for the construction of a new \$10.7 million arena at the Juan de Fuca Recreation site in Colwood. The City of Langford's share of the cost is \$6 million and is to be funded by a 20-year debenture. By agreement among the partners, the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society is managing the construction project. The project commenced in December 2002 and at December 31, 2004 a total of \$10,601,554 had been spent, of which \$5,934,644 is the City of Langford's share.

#### 11. Pension plan:

The City and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the plan), a jointly trusteed pension plan. The Board of Trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing the management of the pension plan, including investment of the assets and administration of the benefits. The pension plan is a multi-employer contributory pension plan. Basic pension benefits provided are defined. The plan has about 130,000 active members and approximately 45,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 29,000 contributors from local governments.

Every three years an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the plan and the adequacy of plan funding. The most recent valuation as at December 31, 2003 indicated an unfunded liability of \$789 million for basic pension benefits. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2006 with results available in 2007. The actuary does not attribute portions of the unfunded liability to individual employers. The City of Langford paid \$189,917 for employer contributions to the plan in fiscal 2004.

## 12. West Shore Parks and Recreation Society acquisition:

The Capital Regional District (the "CRD") transferred the lands and facilities comprising the Juan de Fuca Recreation Centre to the following municipal partners (the "Municipalities") effective January 2, 2002: City of Langford, City of Colwood, District of Highlands, District of Metchosin and the CRD (on behalf of a portion of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area).

The lands and facilities were transferred to the Municipalities in their proportionate share, as specified in the Co-Owners' Agreement. The basis for the valuation of the assets transferred was fair market value, as determined by the BC Assessment Authority through their annual valuation and assessment process. Future improvements are to be allocated among the partners as per the cost sharing formula in effect each year for each service or facility, as outlined in a Members' Agreement. Because the cost sharing formula in the Members' Agreement produces slightly different cost shares for the members from year to year, there is a gain or loss on the opening fund balances. In 2004, the City recorded a gain of \$28,855.

## 12. West Shore Parks and Recreation Society acquisition (continued):

The repayment of the long-term debt associated with the transferred assets is to remain a regional function, as per the terms of an *Agreement to Transfer* between the CRD, the Municipalities and the City. The debt payments are to be charged to Municipalities as part of CRD's annual requisition. The maturity dates to the various borrowings range from 2012 through 2014. The City's share of the debt carried by the CRD with respect to these assets as at December 31, 2004 was \$2,817,292.

In addition, the Municipalities have each become members in the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society, a society incorporated to provide parks, recreation and community services to the Municipalities under contract.

Under terms of an Operating, Maintenance and Management Agreement, the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society is responsible for the equipping, maintenance, management and operation of the facilities located at the recreation centre.

## 14. Sewer franchise and partnering agreement:

On September 20, 2004, the City entered into a franchise and partnering agreement with West Shore Environmental Services Inc. ("WSES") and Terasen Utility Services Inc. ("TUS"). The term of the agreement is 21 years, with a single 21-year renewal. Under the agreement, the City grants an exclusive franchise to WSES to design, construct, finance, own, operate and maintain sanitary sewers in the City. The City also grants an exemption from municipal property tax for sewer infrastructure and WSES has been granted an Order in Council to extend that exemption to property taxes for all other jurisdictions. Upon termination of the agreement, the sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES will be acquired by the City for a nominal payment.

WSES will recover its capital costs by imposition of a sewer capital recovery fee ("SCRF") on owners of property who wish to connect to the sewer. WSES will also bill and collect all user fees. Fees are frozen for five years from the implementation of the agreement. WSES will pay the City franchise fees that are estimated to total \$11 million over the 21-year term of the agreement.

The City will record the costs of sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES as a capital asset and record a corresponding account payable to WSES. The account payable will be reduced as SCRF's are collected. In 2004, the value of capital assets recorded was \$564,817.
