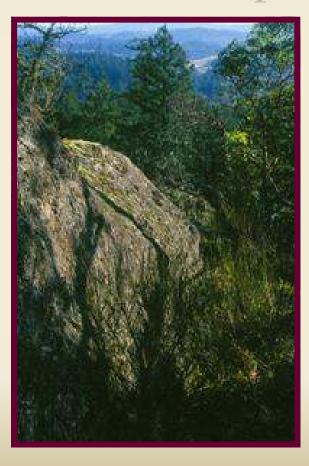

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Executive Summary

2005 was the third year of the 3-year electoral mandate given to the Council elected in December 2002 which consists of:

Mayor Stewart Young Councillor Denise Blackwell Councillor Winnie Sifert Councillor John Goudy Councillor Lanny Seaton Councillor Lillian Szpak Councillor Matt Sahlstrom

The Standing Committee system continued for the twelfth year. The Committees enjoy significant continuity of citizen participation providing important community advice to Council. The contributions of volunteer citizens are effective in providing a more informed participation of the Langford citizens in the decision making process.

2005 was a busy year for community improvements. Work began on the new City Centre Park Sports Field and Dry Floor Arena Complex. The Ed Fisher Memorial Sports Field was completed on Happy Valley at Isabel Road. Over 1.1 kilometers of new sidewalks were built in 2005 with an additional \$271,414 contributed from developers to the Sidewalk Reserve Fund.

A number of major rezoning applications were completed in 2005, including:

- 1. 1000 Gade Road. The addition of 204 acres to the CD6 comprehensive 6 Bear Mountain Zone added approximately 780 additional residential units to the Bear Mountain Resort Development.
- 2. The rezoning for the Millstream Village Power Centre completed on Millstream Road. This will allow for approximately 300,000 square feet of commercial development. The developer will be providing approximately \$2.5 million of road improvements.
- 3. 948 Flatman/3371 Happy Valley Road (Flatman Heights). This rezoning provided for 98 residential lots and nine new affordable homes.
- 4. 649 to 671 Goldstream Avenue was rezoned to permit 92 condominium dwelling units in a new condominium known as McConnell Place.
- 5. 2655 to 2659 Sooke Road (the Jaswal Lumber site) was rezoned to permit a 42-unit apartment building with ground floor commercial and 24 townhouse units. This will be a significant catalyst for revitalizing the Sooke Road Corridor.

Other highlights for the City of Langford in 2005 included the following:

- 1. Council received a 4 Bloom rating in the National Communities in Bloom contest.
- 2. Council received an Honourable Mention award for Langford's Affordable Housing and Amenity Policy from the Planning Institute of British Columbia.
- 3. Langford awarded the first three affordable homes under the Affordable Housing Program with another 32 affordable homes secured through rezoning.
- 4. Langford Fire Hall No. 2 was rebuilt at the corner of Happy Valley and Sooke Road. This is a significant catalyst for the revitalization of the Sooke Road Corridor.
- 5. Building permits totaled over \$107 million in value with 632 new residential homes added for the population of Langford.

2005 was a very busy year for all departments given the ongoing high levels of growth and community improvements.

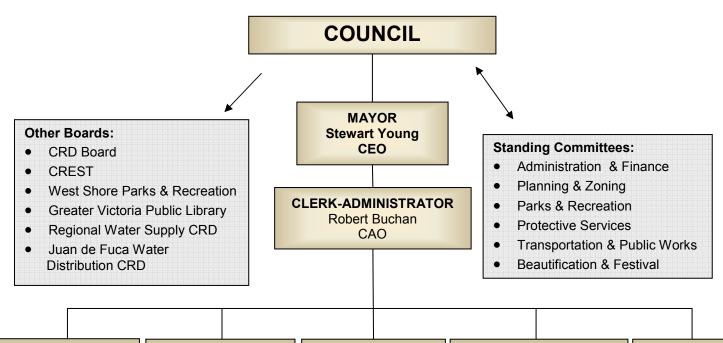

2005 City of Langford Accomplishments

- 1. Completed north side boulevard landscaping sidewalks on Goldstream Avenue between Granderson and Grainger Road.
- 2. Completed landscaping sidewalk extension on Goldstream Avenue west of Jacklin Road in front of Langford United Church.
- 3. Completed landscape sidewalk improvements on west side of Jacklin Road and Jenkins Road intersection.

2. Planning:

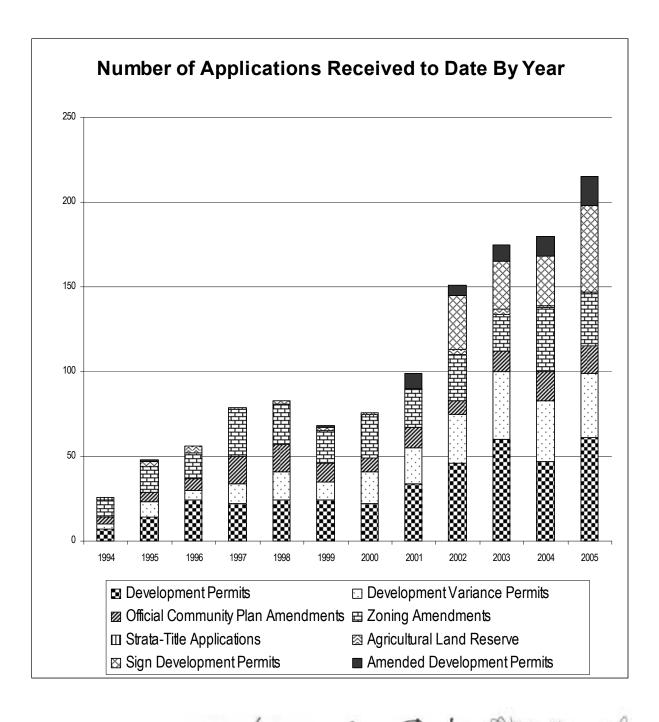
- a) Parking Inventory: Complete

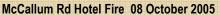

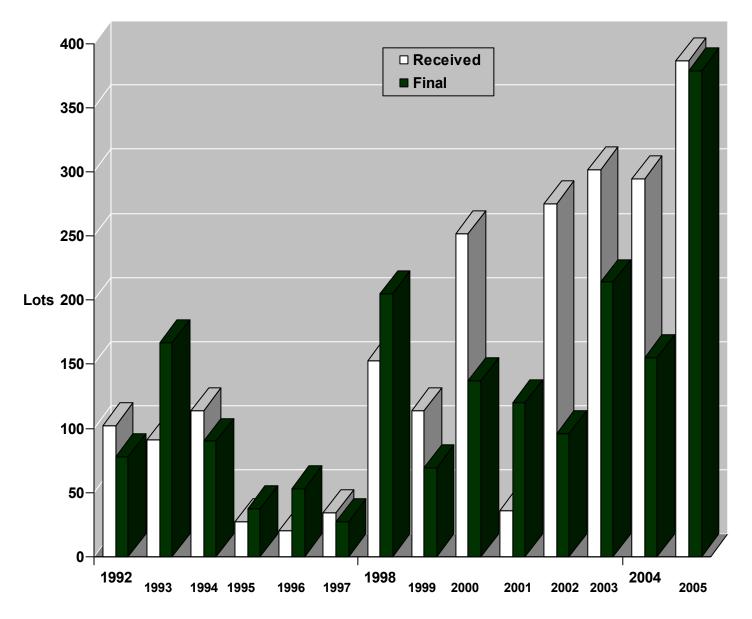

The City of Langford is incorporated and operates under the provisions of the British Columbia Local Government Act.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The consolidated financial statements of the City of Langford (the "City") are prepared by management in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments, as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board ("PSAB") of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the City are as follows:

(a) Reporting entity:

The consolidated financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances and in financial position of the reporting entity. The financial statements also reflect the proportionate consolidation of the City's share of the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society.

(b) Revenue recognition:

Sources of revenue are recorded on the accrual basis and include revenues in the period in which the transactions or events occurred that gave rise to the revenues and expenditures in the period the goods and services are acquired and a liability is incurred or transfers are due.

Revenue unearned in the current period is recorded as deferred revenue or deposits.

(c) Fund accounting:

Funds within the consolidated financial statements consist of the operating, capital, sewer and reserves funds. Transfers between funds are recorded as adjustments to the appropriate fund balance.

(d) Investments:

The investments are recorded at cost which approximates fair market value.

(e) Capital assets:

Capital assets acquired or constructed are recorded at cost as expenditures in the period they are acquired. Capital assets contributed from developers are reported at estimated cost.

Depreciation is not recorded on capital assets.

(f) Reserve for future expenditures:

Certain amounts, as approved by Council, are set aside in reserves for future operating and capital expenditures. Transfers to and/or from reserves are reflected as an adjustment to the respective fund.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2005

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(g) Equity in capital assets:

Equity in capital assets represents the investment in capital assets, after deducting the portion financed by related debt.

(h) Government transfers:

Government transfers are recognized in the consolidated financial statements as revenues in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be made.

(i) Use of estimates:

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the period. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include collectability of government receivables relating to construction contracts and valuation of sewer infrastructure constructed. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. Deferred revenue - development cost charges:

This restricted revenue liability represents funds received from developers for capital expenditures. In accordance with the British Columbia Local Government Act, these funds must be deposited into a separate reserve fund. In accordance with PSAB recommendations, the City records development cost charges as deferred revenue. When the related costs are incurred, the development cost charges are then recognized as revenue.

The short-term debt is comprised of MFA interim financing and bears interest at the Bank of Montreal 30-day banker's acceptance rate.

(b) Long-term debt:

The City issues its debt instruments through the MFA. The amount payable is net of sinking fund balances of \$3,332,178 (2004 - \$2,733,848).

7. Sewer franchise and partnering agreement:

During 2004, the City entered into a franchise and partnering agreement with West Shore Environmental Services Inc. ("WSES") and Terasen Utility Services Inc. ("TUS"). The term of the agreement is 21 years, with a single 21-year renewal. Under the agreement, the City grants an exclusive franchise to WSES to design, construct, finance, own, operate and maintain sanitary sewers in the City. The City also grants an exemption from municipal property tax for sewer infrastructure and WSES has been granted an Order in Council to extend that exemption to property taxes for all other jurisdictions. Upon termination of the agreement, the sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES will be acquired by the City for a nominal payment.

WSES will recover its capital costs by imposition of a sewer capital recovery fee ("SCRF") on owners of property who wish to connect to the sewer. WSES will also bill and collect all user fees. Fees are frozen for five years from the implementation of the agreement. WSES will pay the City franchise fees that are estimated to total \$11 million over the 21-year term of the agreement.

The City records the costs of sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES (2005 - \$15,652,893) and a corresponding remaining cost to be recovered. The remaining cost to be recovered is reduced as SCRF's are collected.

8. Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia debt reserve fund deposits:

The Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia ("MFA") provides capital financing for regional districts and their member municipalities. The MFA is required to establish a Debt Reserve Fund. Each regional district through its member municipalities who share in the proceeds of a debt issue is required to lodge security by means of demand notes and pay into the Debt Reserve Fund certain amounts set out in the debt agreements. The MFA pays into the Debt Reserve Fund these monies from which interest earned thereon, less administrative expenses, becomes an obligation to the regional districts. It must then use this fund if, at any time, there are insufficient funds to meet payments on its obligations. When this occurs, the regional districts may be called upon to restore the fund.

Upon maturity of a debt issue, the unused portion of the Debt Reserve Fund established for that issue will be discharged to the City. The proceeds from these discharges will be credited to income in the year they are received. As at December 31, 2005 the total of the Debt Reserve Fund was \$533,284 (2004 - \$527,595).

9. Commitments and contingencies:

(a) Contingent liabilities:

- (i) The City, as a member of the Capital Regional District, is jointly and severally liable for their net capital liabilities.
- (ii) The loan agreements with the MFA provide that if the MFA does not have sufficient funds to meet payments on its obligations, it shall make payments from the Debt Reserve Fund which, in turn, is established by a similar Debt Reserve Fund in the City and all other borrowing participants. If the Debt Reserve Fund is deficient, the MFA's obligations become a liability of the regional district and may become a liability of the participating municipalities.
- (iii) The City is a shareholder and member of the Capital Region Emergency Service Telecommunications (CREST) Incorporated whose services provide centralized emergency communications, and related public safety information services to municipalities, regional districts, the provincial and federal governments and their agencies, and emergency service organizations throughout the Greater Victoria region and the Gulf Islands. Members' obligations to share in funding ongoing operations and any additional costs relating to capital assets are to be contributed pursuant to a Members' Agreement.

(b) Litigation liability:

There are several lawsuits pending in which the City is involved. It is considered that the potential claims against the City resulting from such litigation will be covered by insurance and not materially affect the consolidated financial statements of the City.

(c) Commitments:

- (i) The City entered into a long-term contract with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for the provision of police services effective October 1, 1994. Under the terms of this contract, the City is responsible for 90% of policing costs. The 2006 estimated cost of this contract is \$2,804,750.
- (ii) Effective for 2002, the City together with the other owners of the Juan de Fuca Recreation Complex entered into a five-year commitment with the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society for the operation and maintenance of the facilities. Annual commitments are apportioned to each municipality based on annual municipal converted assessment values. The City's commitment for 2006 is \$1,567,850.

12. West Shore Parks and Recreation Society (the "Society"):

(a) Capital asset transfer:

The Capital Regional District (the "CRD") transferred the lands and facilities comprising the Juan de Fuca Recreation Centre to the following municipal partners (the "Municipalities") effective January 2, 2002: City of Langford, City of Colwood, District of Highlands, The District of Metchosin and the CRD (on behalf of a portion of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area).

The lands and facilities were transferred to the Municipalities in their proportionate share, as specified in the *Co-Owners' Agreement*. Future improvements are allocated among the partners as per the cost sharing formula in effect each year for each service or facility, as outlined in a *Members' Agreement*. Because the cost sharing formula in the *Members' Agreement* produces slightly different cost shares for the members from year to year, there is a gain or loss on the opening fund balances. In 2005, the City recorded a gain of \$4,260.

The repayment of the long-term debt associated with the transferred assets will continue to be a regional function, in accordance with the terms of an *Agreement to Transfer* between the CRD, the Municipalities and the Society. The debt payments are charged to the Municipalities as part of CRD's annual requisition. The maturity dates of the various borrowings range from 2012 through 2014. The proportionate share of the debt funded by the City through the requisition process as at December 31, 2005 was \$2,472,735.

The Municipalities have each become members in the Society, which was incorporated to provide parks, recreation and community services to the Municipalities under contract. Under terms of an *Operating, Maintenance and Management Agreement*, the Society is responsible to equip, maintain and operate the facilities located at the recreation centre.

14. Pension plan:

The City and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the plan), a jointly trusteed pension plan. The Board of Trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing the management of the pension plan, including investment of the assets and administration of the benefits. The pension plan is a multi-employer contributory pension plan. Basic pension benefits provided are defined. The plan has about 130,000 active members and approximately 48,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 30,000 contributors from local governments.

Every three years an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the plan and the adequacy of plan funding. The most recent valuation as at December 31, 2003 indicated an unfunded liability of \$789 million for basic pension benefits. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2006 with results available in 2007. The actuary does not attribute portions of the unfunded liability to individual employers. 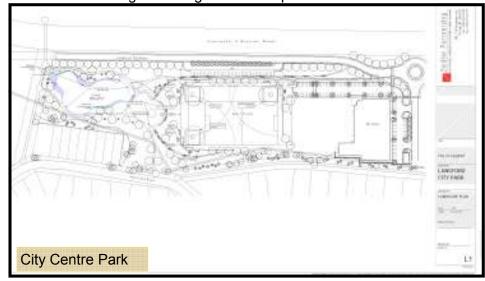
