Executive Summary

2007 was the second year of the three-year electoral mandate given to the Council elected in December 2005 which consists of:

Mayor Stewart Young Councillor Denise Blackwell Councillor Winnie Sifert Councillor John Goudy Councillor Lanny Seaton Councillor Lillian Szpak Councillor Matt Sahlstrom

The Standing Committee system continued for the fourteenth year. The Committees enjoy significant continuity of citizen participation providing important community advice to Council. The contributions of volunteer citizens are effective in providing a more informed participation of the Langford citizens in the decision making process.

2007 was a busy year for community improvements. Work continued on the new City Centre Park Sports Field and Council established a vision for the full build out of the City Centre Park. 6.5 kilometers of new sidewalks were built in 2007.


A number of major rezoning applications were completed in 2007, including:

- 1. Westhills: Large-scale development as a proposed LEED[™] neighbourhood consisting of approximately 6,000 new residential units, supporting commercial, civic and educational uses, with approximately 121 ha (302 acres) of the subject property being designated as parkland (roughly equivalent to 87.6 ha (216 acres) or 40% of the total land area).
- 2. 2850 Aldwynd Road—4 storey condominium project.
- 3. 2812, 2814, 2816, 2818 Jacobson and 2815, 2817 Jacklin Road—multi-family dwelling (95 units)
- 4. 611 Goldstream and 604, 608, 612 Fairway Avenue—multi-family dwellings (94 units).
- 5. 2715 and 2719 Peatt Road (the Blackberry) multi-family dwellings (30 units).


Other highlights for the City of Langford in 2007 included the following:

- Council received a 5 bloom rating in the National Communities in Bloom contest.
- 2. Langford was invited to sit on the Canadian Green Buildings Council LEEDND Committee to assist in bringing LEEDND to Canada.
- Langford awarded its 27th affordable home with the Affordable Housing Program.
- 4. Langford had a record year in construction with permits totally over \$152,900,456 in value, and 699 new residential homes adding to the City's population.

2007 was a very busy year for all departments given the ongoing high levels of growth and community improvements.



2007 City of Langford Accomplishments

Planning Initiatives:

- **1. Applications:** The City of Langford received 262 planning applications in 2007, an increase of 11.5% over 2006.
- 2. Commercial/Business Park/Industrial Development Permits: 18 Development Permits were issued in 2007 for commercial and business park/industrial buildings. Together these development permits represent approximately 424,600 ft² of new commercial/business park floorspace for Langford, and this is nearly 125,000 ft² more commercial floorspace than was approved by development permit in 2006.
- 3. Multi-Family Residential Development Permits: Approximately 1100 multi-family dwelling units were approved by Development Permit in Langford in 2007, of which roughly three-quarters will be located at Bear Mountain. Approximately the same number of units were approved by development permit in 2006, with two-thirds of those being at Bear Mountain.
- 4. City of Langford Official Community Plan (OCP) Update: Consultant Holland Barrs and Associates led the City of Langford and the City of Colwood concurrently through a joint OCP review process. The result was an entirely new OCP in draft form by the end of 2007;
- 5. Riparian Areas Regulation: New Design Guidelines for Riparian Areas were adopted in 2007 to reflect changes in Provincial legislation with respect to riparian (lake and streamside) areas;
- **6. Langford Trolley:** With financial contributions from the development community, Langford purchased its first trolley bus, and initiated the Langford Express Trolley Service (LETS). Service began on July 7th at the opening of the 2007 Langford Festival, which celebrated the City's 15th anniversary of incorporation. The trolley service provides an internal community transit service for Langford on a donation basis, and features the use of B20 bio-diesel fuel, front-mounted bike rack for cyclists wishing to split their mode of transportation, storage space for parcels, a spacious 37-seat wooden interior, and a regular 1 hour loop schedule;
- 7. Affordable Housing: Seven (7) future affordable housing units were obtained as conditions of rezoning in 2007, to be provided at the time of subdivision. To date, twenty-seven (27) affordable housing units have been constructed, three (3) more are currently under construction, and twenty (20) were completed and sold to eligible families in 2007. Langford's Affordable Housing, Parks and Amenity Contribution Policy was amended to include opportunity for the creation of off-site and multi-family residential units, new contribution fees of \$500 per unit of development, rental assistance program for low-income families, mandatory secondary suites program, and new visitability requirements for all Affordable Housing Program units;
- 8. Agricultural Land Reserve: A comprehensive agrology study of the lands in Langford that are within the Agriculture Land Reserve was completed. This work was forwarded to the Langford's Official Community Plan consultant, and policies regarding agricultural lands have been integrated into the draft OCP;

- 9. Park and Amenity Contribution Policy: Park and Amenity Contribution aspects of the Affordable Housing, Park and Amenity Contribution Policy were revised and updated based on refining contributions by geographic region of Langford. This policy is now a comprehensive guide for developers wishing to understand what park and amenity contribution requirements may be at the time of rezoning;
- **10. Manufactured Home Park Redevelopment Policy:** This policy was modified to include a mandatory compensation plan for all residents living in modular or manufactured home parks that undergo redevelopment;
- **11. Communities in Bloom:** Langford received a score of 5 out of a possible 5 blooms in the 2007 Communities in Bloom National Contest, and an overall score of 87.55%. Several new initiatives were launched in 2007 such as the Community Banner Project, Beautification Grant Program, wildflowers along the Trans-Canada Highway, dog waste disposal program, integrated pest management program and the Langford trolley. The annual Garden Contest, in conjunction with Communities in Bloom, was held for the fourth time in 2007.
- **12. City of Langford Calendar:** Langford produced the second of what hopefully will be an annual calendar that highlights scenes of Langford, with proceeds going to local charities.
- **13. Downtown Beautification:** The City of Langford added over \$35,000 to the Downtown Beautification fund through developer contributions. Two notable pieces of public art will also be provided at The Blackberry development (2715/2719 Peatt Road) and at 2850 Aldwynd Road.
- 14. Westhills Green Community: The Westhills Green Community Master Plan and zoning were amended in 2007, and through this process the undisturbed portion of Parkdale Hill (1321 Parkdale Drive) is to be transferred to the City as park at the time of the first phase of subdivision at Westhills. Through this rezoning, the City of Langford also secured, among other things, the use of porous concrete pavers throughout the commercial areas of Westhills and the inclusion of community agriculture lands within the Westhills development;



Planning Department Year End Report for 2007

2007 was another busy year for Planning and Zoning in Langford. Overall, development applications exceeded 2006 levels by 11%, with the greatest increase being in Development Variance Permits and Zoning amendments. The Planning Department was also busy with the development of a new Official Community Plan for Langford, with the help of lead consultant Holland Barrs Planning Group. The following summarizes the Planning function for 2007:






Some of the key projects that the Planning Department has been involved with this year include:


- OCP Review Langford began a comprehensive review of its Official Community Plan in 2007, In conjunction with a similar review in the City of Colwood. This review began with a Futures Forum, lead by consultant Holland Barrs Ltd. in June, and continued with a four day design charette and public review in November. The OCP review also includes Langford's agricultural lands strategy and revised measures towards streamside and lakeshore protection;
- Communities in Bloom Langford again competed in the Communities in Bloom National Contest, and received five blooms. City of Langford and West Shore Chamber of Commerce staff represented the community at the National Communities in Bloom Conference in Moncton, NB;
- **Affordable Housing –** By the end of 2007, thirty (30) affordable single family homes had either been constructed and sold, or were under construction, as part of the City's Affordable Housing program;
- Off-Street Parking Strategy With assistance from lead engineering consultant Boulevard Transportation Group Ltd. and an adhoc steering committee to consider Off-Street Parking requirements, a comprehensive review of Langford's off-street parking requirements was undertaken in 2007, and near completion by year end:
- **Sign Bylaw Review** With the assistance of an adhoc steering committee, a comprehensive review of Langford's Sign Bylaw was undertaken in 2007, and was near completion by year end;
- **Archaeological Overview Assessment** staff have completed an overview of possible archaeological sites as Phase 1 of an overall archaeological assessment of Langford;
- **Downtown Art Strategy** Staff continue to explore opportunities for statuary as part of rezoning applications.



Subdivision Application and Approval Synopsis

In 2007 the City received subdivision applications to create 170 new lots and gave approval for registration of 178 new lots.

There has been a drop in both subdivision applications and approvals in 2007 which may be a result of slowing market conditions or a result of the restriction on rezoning applications north of the Trans Canada Highway and drainage concerns and road network "unknowns" in South Langford.


It is anticipated that as the Spencer Road Interchange progresses, that the area north of the highway may be reconsidered for increased density through rezoning, and subdivision applications will increase. In South Langford, consultants are providing further recommendations to improve/reduce drainage-concern areas, and work with the Ministry of Highways as it relates to the Sooke Road Corridor, Happy Valley intersection, and Walfred Road are nearing completion. As these processes complete, it will allow several projects that have been on-hold to proceed. If market conditions remain relatively constant, the City could expect an increase in applications for subdivision for the following reasons:

- 1. commencement of the Westhills development,
- 2. the adoption of the South Langford Neighbourhood Plan (and completion of the drainage study),
- 3. Near completion of the Route 14A Corridor study (Sooke Road), which encompasses Walfred Road and Happy Valley
- 4. The Spencer Road Interchange project under construction improving access North of the Highway
- 5. And continued installation of municipal sewers North of the Trans Canada Highway Continued subdivision applications in the Bear Mountain development (now possible due to the Spencer Road Interchange).


It should be noted that if the interchange and improvements to South Langford drainage are not completed, subdivision activity should remain consistent with 2007 levels.

Areas of Probable Subdivision Activity for 2008


Bear Mountain continues to be the largest area of subdivision activity however, the significance of Bear Mountain to the overall subdivision activity may diminish with the start of the "Westhills" development, the adoption of the South Langford Neighbourhood Plan and the availability of large parcels of land in the Happy Valley region. Installation of municipal sewers in the Setchfield/Treanor area has allowed several moderate sized subdivisions of lands that were previously used as septic fields. Other areas of possible activity may be between Langford Lake and the Trans Canada Highway and the Walfred Road area.



In 2007 the Parks Department accomplished the following:

Central Langford:

City Center Park: additional 3.6 acres donated by Westhills, for a total of 18.2 acres. Donated land allows for 2nd full size playing field. Stormwater pond has been shaped in 2007. Total proposed amenities for City Center Park are:

- 2 full size artificial grass fields suitable for rugby, soccer and football play (field rated to FIFA 2 star).
- ∂ 2 storey, 24 lane bowling facility.
- ∂ NHL sized ice rink/ multipurpose arena
- ∂ 18 hole mini golf.
- ∂ 3000 sq.ft. children's water play park.
- ∂ 1500 seat stadium with bleacher seating to 2500.
- ∂ Indoor children's playground.
- *∂* Stormwater pond with model boat launch and wetland area.
- ∂ Multi use pathways, bridges and landscape.

Langford Lake: completion of multi use trail connecting Goldstream Avenue to Leigh Road.

Bylaw Enforcement Issues 2007

2007 Municipal Bylaw Enforcement and Community Safety Program

Langford Council's innovative Community Safety Program which was started early in 2006 continues to be a well received success in the community. The project, designed to both enhance community safety, and deter vandalism or disturbances, was intended to be entirely proactive. Council anticipated through its implementation, to be in a strong position to manage community safety problems before they arose.

Langford shares its police resource with four other municipalities, the Provincial territory and First Nations Bands. The result of this can mean delayed police response to lower level nuisances or problems during high volume call times. Langford Council recognized all of these realities, so was focused on making maximum use of its police resource while still ensuring a level of public service.

The intention of Langford Council through the implementation of its Community Safety Officer Initiative is to create a complementary service to the RCMP. This service is designed to employ suitably trained and equipped Municipal Bylaw Enforcement Officers as Community Safety Officers (CSOs) who perform an essential role, and extend the range of overall activities the police are able to provide to our community. The goal is to remove some of the demand from the RCMP to deal with issues that fall squarely under City Bylaws, and to restructure some of the City Bylaws to an increased usefulness. Many B.C. communities depend on their police to enforce local Bylaws such as Noise, Graffiti (and other vandalism), Parks regulations, Truck Route (road infrastructure preservation) and others in addition to their mandate to enforce the superior levels of Federal and Provincial Statues. Langford's best practice initiative in its CSO Program is designed to fully utilize the Peace Officer status of Bylaw Enforcement Officers confirmed in recent B.C. case law to take a greater lead in dealing with complaints of local regulatory Bylaws while also providing a highly visible uniformed presence on streets and in Parks and Trails.

Community Safety Officers are fully conversant in City Bylaws and are trained in areas such as Mediation, Restorative Justice, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), Officer Safety, and through this training are able to settle disputes among neighbours, deal with "youth on the street" issues and consult with business and home owners to lessen victimization of themselves and their properties, through improved target hardening strategies. Langford's CSO have all arrived on the job with existing skill sets provided by their previous backgrounds.



A large part of the success of this project to date is due to the high level of cooperation and liaison work with the West Shore RCMP. Langford's CSOs attend evening Watch briefings at the local detachment to share information and they patrol the community in clearly marked vehicles, on bikes or on foot to provide a highly visible presence. CSOs typically work in pairs and can be seen on City streets and in Parks/Trails on most evenings providing a level of observation and response which has served to heighten citizens' safety and comfort levels. In some cases, they work

alongside members of the RCMP or the Provincial Commercial Vehicle Safety Enforcement Inspectors in conducting joint traffic operations which are focused on motoring safety. These joint works have also effectively served to raise the public profile of the CSOs as being part of the local public safety and enforcement landscape.

The CSOs take an oath of allegiance and are subject to a complaints process similar to the requirements under the *Police Act*. On the very rare occasion where they are required to affect an arrest, they rely on the *Criminal Code's* citizen arrest powers and authority to use force. They are provided with the most current self defensive training and tools, and they communicate directly with the members of the RCMP through portable radios. They are often the "first line" response to noisy house parties and open burning complaints, or to assist with emergency traffic control at motor vehicle accidents. Their responses effectively free up police resources or often eliminate the need for a Fire Duty Officer from the Volunteer Fire Department to be called out because the CSOs are actively enforcing Langford's own Bylaws. Officers can issue Municipal Tickets (fines) for violations and appear in Court to act on behalf of the Crown in the prosecution of disputed tickets, much in the way police officers prosecute Provincial Violation Tickets. The Community Safety Officers will defer to the police when the seriousness of a situation dictates and they serve as well trained observers for those more serious issues.

How is it paid for?

In 2004, the Provincial Government expanded the funding for the Traffic Fine Revenue Sharing Grant Program from a fixed \$10 million appropriation to 100% of net traffic fine revenues. During the 2004 to 2007 period, Council allocated a portion of this funding grant to the addition of police officers and support staff for the local detachment as did many other B.C. communities during that time. However, Langford Council went a step further by allocating approximately one third of the grant monies to staffing and training of the CSO positions.

Our Scorecard.

After two years, Langford now enjoys an expanded community presence with five Community Safety Officers. The CSO Initiative continues to show its worth and while development continues a number of clear successes can be reported:

<u>Success Story 1</u> - Langford Council and the CSOs working together with local School District 62 created complimentary Policies and Bylaws that will help curb nighttime vandalism at schools within Langford boundaries by empowering the CSOs as agents for the School District on school properties. This move forward is based on these factors:

- ∂ School District 62 operates 13 facilities in Langford.
- In 2006, the total vandalism repair costs at those facilities were \$31,432.28. In the first quarter of 2006, damage costs had already reached \$13,213.40.
- Since intermittent CSO patrols of just five of the "hot" schools, the School District repair costs in the first guarter of 2007 are down by 68% and only amounting to \$4,178.82.

<u>Success Story 2</u> – Community Safety Officers have been diligent in dealing with graffiti vandalism. In a current investigation, Langford CSOs have been able to document up to 50+ single sourced incidents of graffiti "tagging" on various public and private properties. Some of these spray painted "tags" are up to two meters high and five meters long. Properties damaged include City signs and structures, Ministry of Transportation structures and sound attenuation fencing as well as numerous privately owned buildings and other structures. Current estimates place damage to these properties at between \$40,000 to \$50,000.

Notable stats:

Numbers of new complaints received in 2007 is nearly double that of 2005.

Consistently, about 96% of cases are resolved each year regardless of complaint increases.

"Community Safety" and "Fireworks" figures more clearly relate to number of patrol days; the stat does not capture numbers of distinct incidents.

Similarly, a single count of Graffiti issues may represent up to 200 separate incidents of graffiti vandalism caused by one "tagger," depending on the case.

Traffic /Roads issues, which more often result in the issuance of a Warning Notice or Municipal Ticket, doubled over 2005 while overall numbers of Municipal Tickets has not risen, as this table of statistics related to Resolved Complaints indicates:

The rise in number of disputed Municipal Tickets in 2007 (double over 2006) can also be explained by the rise in Traffic matters, as Traffic tickets are more often routinely disputed than other enforcement tickets.
