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Executive Summary

2008 marked the final year of the three-year electoral mandate given to the Council elected in December 2005. The 2008 City of Langford Council consisted of:

Councillor Matt Sahlstrom

In November 2008, the Municipal election was held with Roger Wade being elected to replace Councillor John Goudy who did not run for re-election. The Mayor was acclaimed and all the other Councillors were re-elected for another three-year term. The Standing Committee system continued for the fifteenth year. The committees benefit from the significant continuity of citizen participation, resulting in the provision of advice to council from the community. The contributions of volunteer citizens are an effective means of ensuring Langford residents are an important part of the decision-making process. That was underscored in the completion of a new Official Community Plan in cooperation with the City of Colwood in June, which involved extensive consultation with the public.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Langford continued to forge ahead with community improvements, with an emphasis on recreational and environmental initiatives. An artificial all-weather playing field for rugby, soccer and footfall - the first of its kind - was installed at City Centre Park. Other projects completed include an outdoor skating park, Play Zone and mini-golf attractions. A pilot project was launched to provide solar lighting for trails, and two new playgrounds were completed.

PLANNING

Langford's planning department added to its impressive collection of awards with its second national Communities in Bloom Five Blooms award. Other awards included a National Housing Award from the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, a Leadership and Innovation Award from the Union of British Columbia Municipalities, a National Sustainable Development Award, and a Community Excellence Award for the joint Official Community Plan completed with the City of Colwood.

Langford also received an Honourable Mention from the Canadian Institute of Planners for its Affordable Housing Strategy. Thirty-four houses have been completed under the plan, representing a donation of \$6.8 million from the development community.


ENGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS

Work continues on the Spencer Interchange, with completion expected in 2010. The Peatt/ Station/Phipps/Meaford signalized intersection was completed in April 2009. The project includes a transit exchange that will become the hub of Langford's long-term commuter rail and transit strategy.



Applications: The City of Langford received 190 planning applications in 2008, 73 fewer applications than in 2007 and 46 fewer than 2006. The greatest reduction in applications were in the areas of Official Community Plan amendment applications (21) and Sign Development Permit applications (21). Although applications to rezone land fell by 27% (13 applications), the number of applications was only 2 less than what was received in 2006.

Commercial/Business Park/Industrial Development Permits: The City of Langford issued Development Permits for approximately 365,600 ft² of new commercial/business park floorspace in Langford. Although this is roughly 59,000 ft² less than what was approved in 2007, it represents approximately 66,000 ft² more commercial/business park floorspace than was approved by development permit in 2006.

Multi-Family Residential Development Permits: Approximately 240 multi-family dwelling units were approved by Development Permit in 2008. Although the number of dwelling units approved by Development Permit, did decline from approximately 1100 in 2007, construction has begun on 106 of the dwelling units represented by permits issued in 2008. The ratio of projects constructed to projects approved by development permit has not been this high in recent years.

City of Langford Official Community Plan (OCP) Update: The City of Langford adopted a new Official Community Plan in June 2008, following a successful OCP review process led by HB Lanarc Consulting (formerly Holland Barrs and Associates) that was undertaken concurrently with the City of Colwood's OCP review.

Lakeside Protection: Council adopted Bylaw 1170 in 2008 which, as an additional measure of protection for riparian areas, increased the permitted minimum lot size for subdivision of land adjacent to Langford, Glen and Florence Lakes;

Affordable Housing: To date, thirty-four (34) affordable housing units have been constructed within Langford Affordable Housing Program. Seven (7) of these affordable homes were constructed in 2008. A number of additional partnerships have been negotiated within the Affordable Housing Strategy, including a partnership with M'akola Housing Society to construct approximately 46 units of subsidized rental housing at 554 Goldstream Avenue. Langford's new OCP emphasizes policies around housing diversity, affordability and accessibility.

Agricultural Lands: Council established a standing Agricultural Advisory Committee in 2008 to review and provide recommendations with respect to applications made through the City of Langford to the BC Agriculture Land Commission.

Affordable Housing, Park and Amenity Contribution Policy: The City of Langford's Affordable Housing, Park and Amenity Contribution Policy was further revised and updated in 2008 by refining contributions according to their geographic area of Langford. This policy is now a comprehensive guide for developers wishing to understand what park and amenity contribution requirements are likely to be at the time of rezoning;

Communities in Bloom: Langford received a score of 5 out of a possible 5 blooms in the 2008 Communities in Bloom National Contest, and an overall score of 87.13%. Langford also received the 2008 Canada Lands Company Sustainable Development National Award. Several new initiatives were launched in 2008 such as Active Transportation Plan, Gardens in Motion, Lighthouse Christian Academy Community Garden and Parkdale Creek Restoration Program, Dog Waste Program, Bryn Maur Rd Permeable Pavement Pilot Project, Rain Garden Pilot Project, and Lady Bird Beetle Release. The annual Garden Contest, in conjunction with Communities in Bloom, was held for the fifth time in 2008.

New Transmission Towers Consultation Policy: Council established a new policy with respect to telecommunication transmission towers in residential areas, and requirements for public consultation. Council also established an adhoc advisory committee to look at the issue of new transmission towers and public consultation.

City of Langford Calendar: Langford produced the third of what hopefully will be an annual calendar that highlights scenes of Langford, with proceeds going to local charities.

Downtown Beautification: The City of Langford added over \$19,000 to the Downtown Beautification fund through developer contributions.

Sign Bylaw Update: An adhoc committee was struck in 2008 with the Westshore Developers' Association to look at a comprehensive revision to Sign Bylaw No. 700. Council received a draft bylaw in January 2009. Adoption is expected in March 2009;





















Projects:

Some of the key projects that the Planning Department has been working on in 2008, and will continue to work on through 2009 include:

Langford Energy and Emissions Reduction Strategy: With assistance from BC Hydro and the Ministry of Community Development, the City of Langford will serve as a pilot for the development of an municipal energy and emissions reduction strategy. The Planning Department intends to work with a consultant to further explore the components of a corporate strategy for reducing the City of Langford's carbon footprint and report back to Council on findings of a Carbon Footprint Analysis (CFA) and Community Energy and Emissions Reduction Strategy (CEERS).

Sooke Road Revitalization Plan: As an economic stimulus measure, and building on the policies of the new Official Community Plan, the Planning Department, in concert with the Engineering Department and the Ministry of Transportation, intends to create a revitalization plan for the Sooke Road commercial corridor.

Langford's Affordable Housing Program The Planning Department will continue to implement the Affordable Housing program and improve the policy where appropriate; develop criteria and process for Rental Subsidy Program; market and subsidized rental units in partnership with NGO's, other levels of government, industry.

Sustainable/Affordable or Pocket House Show Home: Staff will continue to explore opportunities to partner with developers wishing to create sustainable, affordable housing alternatives so that they may showcase new technologies and techniques that others might follow.

Active Transportation Plan: With the assistance of a co-op student from UVIC in the summer of 2008, the Planning Department gathered and collated a wide variety of information (including an online survey) pertaining to active, green or alternate transportation options in Langford. In keeping with active transportation policies of the new OCP, this plan will be a collation of bicycle routes, safe routes to school, trail and walking routes as well as facilities for bicycling and transit. Staff will prepare a draft Green Transportation Plan in 2009, which should be able to replace the now 10-year old Bicycle and Trail Master Plans.

Intensive Residential Design Guidelines: Staff have nearly completed revised design guidelines for small lot detached residential development, and will also be preparing new design guidelines for small lot detached residential development. Both sets of design guidelines have been prepared in consultation with the Westshore Developers' Association, and will be brought to the Planning and Zoning Committee for review and recommendation to Council.

Downtown Beautification and Public Art: Staff will continue to look for opportunities to obtain contributions towards downtown beautification and public art, as well as continue to work with CRD Parks and the Westshore Arts Council towards an installation of public art in conjunction with the E&N Railside Trail Project. Staff expect that an exciting three-piece art installation designed by Derek Rowe (Artform Sculpture Studio) entitled "Alice" will be installed in front of the Goudy Public Library on Goldstream Avenue in the first half of 2009.

Millstream Fish Ladders. In 2007 and 2008 it was reported in the Draft Five Year Financial Plans that Langford may have an opportunity to build an additional (and perhaps last) fish ladder or undertake additional environmental projects on Millstream Creek in 2008, with work to be funded by developer contributions. While this work did not occur in 2007 or 2008, the opportunity to complete this work may arise in 2009 or 2010.

CarShare Langford: The City of Langford will seek ways to sponsor and negotiate partnership for a 'CarShare Langford' program.





Building Inspection Department


2008 recorded the highest construction value for Langford, outstripping the previous record of 2007 by \$90 million. The most active sector in 2008 was the multi-family which added 771 units.

Construction highlights of this year include the completion of the Reflections building at 2745 Veterans' Memorial Parkway. At six storeys it is the tallest building in the downtown core. Additionally, Bear Mountain completed the Finlayson Reach project at 1400 Lynburne Place. With 11 storeys above grade and 3 storeys of underground parking, it is the largest and tallest building constructed to date in Langford. 2008 also saw the start of construction of the Highlander building on Bear Mountain which, when completed in 2010, will be the tallest building in Langford with a total of 16 storeys.







Subdivision Application and Approval Synopsis

In 2008 the City received subdivision applications to create 297 new lots and gave approval for registration of 123 new lots.

There has been a significant increase in Subdivision applications in 2008 (over 2007), however approvals have decreased slightly which may be a result of the difficulty in securing trades (ie. Carpenters / plumbers) during the majority of 2008. For the fourth quarter of 2008, there is a small drop in both applications and approvals, likely a result of poor market conditions brought about by the economic recession and difficulty in borrowing. In 2008, the north side of the Highway moratorium on rezoning remained.

For up-coming years, it is anticipated that as the Spencer Road Interchange progresses, the area north of the highway may be reconsidered for increased density through rezoning, and subdivision applications will increase; in South Langford, consultants are working to a new a storm drainage plan (update to the DCC program to accompany in 2009), and work with the Ministry of Highways as it relates to the Sooke Road Corridor, Happy Valley intersection, and Walfred Road are nearing completion. As these processes complete, it will allow several projects that have been on-hold to proceed.

Due to widely fluctuating market conditions as a result of the global economy, the City may see a stabilization of subdivision applications for the following reasons:

Possible causes of Increases;

- 1. Large projects may, due to the length of construction required, remain active to take advantage of lessening trade wages;
- The City may propose Economic incentives to ensure work is continuing;
- 3. Adoption of the South Langford Neighbourhood Plan (and completion of the drainage study):
- Continued installation of municipal sewers North of the Trans Canada Highway;
- 5. The Spencer Road Interchange project under construction improving access North of the Highway;
- 6. Ongoing subdivision applications in the Bear Mountain development (now possible due to the Spencer Road Interchange);
- Skirt Mountain Rezoning;
- 8. Near completion of the Route 14a Corridor study (Sooke Road), which encompasses Walfred Road and Happy Valley;

Possible causes of decrease:

- The above will be balanced with the ability to borrow and financial institutions confidence to lend.
- 10. Consumers ability to buy.


It should be noted that the number of lots that were applied for in 2008 exceeded the number of lots registered (created) in 2008, so there is a back-log of lots pending.

Areas of Probable Subdivision Activity for 2009

Bear Mountain and potentially Westhills (which experienced a minor slow-down as 2008 completed) continue to be the largest area of subdivision activity, however, the adoption of the South Langford Neighbourhood Plan and the availability of large parcels of land in the Happy Valley region, and the finalization of the Bear Mountain Interchange opening up lands for development West of Florence Lake and between the TCH and Bear Mountain (Skirt Mountain) will ensure activity is spread around the City.

Installation of municipal sewers in the Setchfield/Treanor area continues to allow several moderate sized subdivisions of lands that were previously used as septic fields.

Other areas of possible activity may be the Walfred Road area and south Happy Valley.

Parks and Trails:

Overall:

Langford 2010 – Recreation for family, fitness and fun: Parks hosted a public open house on January 19th at the Legion. The open house was the official launch of the City's recreation campaign – Langford 2010. The open house was very successful, with over 1,000 in attendance (as reported by Goldstream Gazette). The public voted for the stadium and fields to be built first at City Centre Park, followed by the bowling and arena facility.

Central Langford:

<u>City Centre Park</u>: development of City Centre Park continues with the following facilities completed during 2008:

- Artificial turf field #1 completed and suitable for rugby, soccer and football play (field rated to FIFA 2 star).
- ~ 287 sq.m. (3090 sq. ft) water park and outdoor skating rink. Included a community mural painting project on the boarding surrounding the water park.
- ~ 18 hole themed mini golf (mining, jungle and pirate themes).
- ~ Indoor children's playground.
- ~ Main entrance landscape and landscape for mini golf and water park.
- ~ Preliminary design work started for arena and bowling facility.

Hulls Trail: parks organized trail cleanup with 'the Forge Church' youth camp.

<u>Integrated Pest Management</u>: Parks released 35,000 lady bird beetles into 200 trees located in the downtown core. Also installed 20 aphid predator boxes and six cherry bark tortrix moth boxes.

<u>Misc. Small Parks</u>: 2 neighbourhood playgrounds completed – Arncote and Cornerstone Parks, a community barbeque hosted by Parks held in September, well attended by neighbourhood.

North Langford:

<u>Lake Ida Anne</u>: community youth fishery established in partnership with Haig Brown Fly Fishing and Freshwater Fisheries.

<u>Florence Lake</u>: completion of accessible boardwalk and parking at the north end of Florence Lake.

South Langford:

Valley View: Little League ball field underway – anticipated completion date May 2009.

Irwin Park: Parks involved with Earth Day cleanup and tree planting.

Community Safety Initiative

Overview

Langford Council's Community Safety Initiative, now in its 4th year, is intended to complement policing services with trained and equipped Community Safety Officers (CSOs) on patrol in City streets, parks and trails. The mandate of the program is to extend and augment the enforcement service the community receives.



CSOs fulfill this by dealing with issues that fall squarely under City bylaws, by developing those bylaws to increased usefulness, and by applying enforcement during the day and evenings in the City. This reduces some of the demand on police resources and provides a highly visible uniformed presence in the City.

In 2007 the CSOs developed a bicycle patrol function and continue to favour this method as a far more effective—not to mention 100% green--operational choice.



Best practices in the Community Safety program include the CSOs fully exercising their *peace officer status*, an authority established in B.C. case law. As peace officers, CSOs can assist a wide range of other enforcement agencies at the same time they deter actual bylaw infractions in Langford.

How is it paid for?

The provincial government through its Traffic Fine Revenue Sharing Grant Program returns all the traffic fine net revenues to local government. In 2006 Langford Council allocated approximately one third of the City's grant to establish the Community Safety Initiative, and these grant revenues continued to staff and operate the program in 2008.

Tallies

Figure 1 tabulates Community Safety statistics between June and December 2008 and lists enforcement actions but also other services such as assisting the fire department and police, contact with homeless persons, and crime reduction efforts. The following notes provide a brief analysis of a few key statistics.

Public Intoxication: CSOs deter the public consumption of alcohol, a bylaw contravention, by ensuring spirits being illegally consumed in public are poured out on site. In 2008 over



1,200 units of alcohol were 'destroyed locally' this way. This work curtails the incident at hand, conserves police resources, and prevents a considerable amount of alcohol-related crime such as vandalism, assault, and personal injury.

Homeless contact: CSOs contacted homeless persons in the community 106 times in 2008 (over 6 months), primarily repeat encounters with fewer than 15 individuals. CSOs use such contact to monitor individual health and safety, garner information on community safety issues, and disrupt squatter camps on vacant land. As can be expected, contacts occur mainly but not only in the summer months.

Education vs. penalty: As a best practice, CSOs stress education over penalty to promote voluntary compliance. For every Municipal Ticket fine imposed in 2008, officers used re-direction more than 33 times. In 100 instances CSOs directly assisted the RCMP and the fire department, occasionally detaining persons for safety reasons.




Departmental enforcement activities other than those associated with the Community Safety Initiative continued to be tracked quantitatively throughout 2008 so that measurements of the year's activity could be offered. The overall number of recorded cases in the year amounted

to 602 files opened and actioned in the areas of land use, building, traffic, noise and other proven violations of City bylaws.



retaliatory, and invalid reports would not be actioned. Enforcement was suspended for certain bylaws under revision in 2008—for example the Sign Bylaw, which was enforced frequently in 2007. However, where infractions of these bylaws created a safety hazard, action was taken nonetheless.




Fig. 2: 2008 Bylaw Enforcement Activity by Complaint Type

Figure 2 on the next page tabulates the 2008 statistical record of Bylaw Enforcement activity; the following notes provide a brief analysis of those statistics.

False Alarms: West Shore RCMP estimates that a police officer expends about an hour of time on each false alarm occurring in the community. In 2008 Bylaw Enforcement Officers contacted over 700 business and home owners whose systems had generated false alarms, to ensure that the user errors and technical malfunctions causing them were rectified. An unnecessary drain on the policing resource was thus reduced.



Zoning: Enforcement of the Zoning Bylaw accounted for 137 cases, the largest number of which related to unlicenced vehicles and exposed vehicle parts on private property. These are matters which Council has long prioritized and in which the Bylaw Department is generally proactive. However, this category also includes a range of cases including a number of large and complex land use issues which absorb considerable staff time and expertise.

Traffic: As in past years, parking issues predominated the 227 traffic cases of 2008. Individual cases in the tally can represent a simple parking ticket matter or be as complex as the adjustment and enforcement of an entire neighbourhood's parking restrictions. The high -volume delivery of education on cycling regulations is not included here (see the Community Safety statistics on following pages); and this tally also does not include a number of traffic stops, an action which in 2008

Animal Control

Overview

Langford Council contracts animal control services from the Capital Regional District Bylaw Enforcement Services Department, as do many of the region's municipalities. Monthly and annual activity reports are submitted by the CRD to Langford Bylaw Enforcement.

The contract includes management of dog licensing, the provision of pound services, 7-day-a -week enforcement of the City's Animal Control Bylaw, and other value added services. For example, CRD Animal Control liaises with many animal welfare and adoption agencies, to ensure

the best possible chance for unwanted a n d unclaimed animals.

The City of Langford is incorporated and operates under the provisions of the British Columbia Local Government Act and the Community Charter of British Columbia.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The consolidated financial statements of the City of Langford (the "City") are prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for local governments, as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board ("PSAB") of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the City are as follows:

(a) Reporting entity:

The consolidated financial statements reflect the combination of all the assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances and in financial position of the reporting entity. The financial statements also include the proportionate consolidation of the City's share of the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society.

(b) Basis of accounting:

The basis of accounting followed in the financial statement presentation is an accrual basis and includes revenues in the period in which the transactions or events occurred that gave rise to the revenues and when measurable; and expenditures in the period the goods and services are acquired and a liability is incurred or transfers are due.

(c) Fund accounting:

Funds within the consolidated financial statements consist of the operating, capital, sewer and reserve funds. Transfers between funds are recorded as adjustments to the appropriate fund balance.

(d) Investments:

Investments are recorded at cost which approximates fair market value.

(e) Capital assets:

Capital assets acquired or constructed are recognized as expenditures in the period they are acquired and are recorded on the consolidated statement of financial position at historical cost. Capital assets contributed from developers are recorded at estimated cost.

Amortization is not recorded on capital assets.

(f) Deferred revenue:

Deferred revenue includes grants, contributions and other amounts received from third parties pursuant to legislation, regulation and agreement which may only be used in certain programs, in the completion of specific work, or for the purchase of tangible capital assets. In addition, certain user charges and fees are collected for which the related services have yet to be performed. Revenue is recognized in the period when the related expenses are incurred, services performed, or the tangible capital assets are acquired.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2008

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(g) Reserve for future expenditures:

Certain amounts, as approved by Council, are set aside in reserves for future operating and capital expenditures. Transfers to and/or from reserves are reflected as an adjustment to the respective fund.

(h) Equity in capital assets:

Equity in capital assets represents the investment in capital assets, after deducting the portion financed by related debt.

(i) Government transfers:

Government transfers are recognized in the consolidated financial statements as revenues in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be made.

(i) Use of estimates:

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the period. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include collectability of property taxes receivable and government receivables relating to construction contracts and the cost of sewer infrastructure and the sewer infrastructure remaining cost to be recovered. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. Deferred revenue:

(a) Development cost charges.

This restricted revenue liability represents funds received from developers for capital expenditures. In accordance with the British Columbia Local Government Act, these funds must be deposited into a separate reserve fund. In accordance with PSAB recommendations, the City records development cost charges as deferred revenue. When the related costs are incurred the development cost charges are recognized as revenue.

(a) Short-term debt:

The short-term debt is comprised of an interim financing facility through the TD Bank, and bears interest at the Bankers Acceptance Rate plus stamping fee or prime minus 110 basis points.

(b) Long-term debt:

The City issues its debt instruments through the Municipal Finance Authority ("MFA"). The amount payable is net of sinking fund balances of \$5,209,623 (2008 - \$4,551,165).

7. Sewer franchise and partnering agreement:

During 2004, the City entered into a franchise and partnering agreement with West Shore Environmental Services Inc. ("WSES") and Terasen Utility Services Inc. ("TUS"). The term of the agreement is 21 years, with a single 21-year renewal. Under the agreement, the City grants an exclusive franchise to WSES to design, construct, finance, own, operate and maintain sanitary sewers in the City. The City also grants an exemption from municipal property tax for sewer infrastructure and WSES has been granted an Order in Council to extend that exemption to property taxes for all other jurisdictions. Upon termination of the agreement, the sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES will be acquired by the City for a nominal payment.

WSES will recover its capital costs by imposition of a sewer capital recovery fee ("SCRF") on owners of property who wish to connect to the sewer. WSES will also bill and collect all user fees. Fees are frozen for five years from the implementation of the agreement. WSES will pay franchise fees to the City that are estimated to total \$11 million over the 21-year term of the agreement.

The City records the costs of sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES (2008 - \$951,835; 2007 - \$4,587,868) and a corresponding remaining cost to be recovered. The remaining cost to be recovered is reduced as SCRF's are collected.

8. Municipal Finance Authority debt reserve fund deposits:

Under borrowing arrangements with the MFA, the City is required to lodge security by means of demand notes and interest-bearing cash deposits based on the amount of the borrowing. These notes and deposits, which are contingent in nature, are held by the MFA to act as security against the possibility of debt repayment default and are not recorded in the financial statements. As debt principal is retired, demand notes are released and the cash deposits are refunded and recorded as operating income in the period received. As at December 31, 2008 the total of the Debt Reserve Fund was \$551,612 (2007 - \$545,461).

9. Commitments and contingencies:

(a) Contingent liabilities:

- (i) Capital Regional District debt, under provisions of the Local Government Act, is a direct, joint and several liability of the Capital Regional District and each member municipality within the Capital Regional District, including the City.
- (ii) The loan agreements with the MFA provide that if the MFA does not have sufficient funds to meet payments on its obligations, it shall make payments from the Debt Reserve Fund which, in turn, is established by a similar Debt Reserve Fund in the City and all other borrowing participants. If the Debt Reserve Fund is deficient, the MFA's obligations become a liability of the regional district and may become a liability of the participating municipalities.
- (iii) The City is a shareholder and member of the Capital Region Emergency Service Telecommunications (CREST) Incorporated who provides centralized emergency communications and related public safety information services to municipalities, regional districts, the provincial and federal governments and their agencies, and emergency service organizations throughout the Greater Victoria region and the Gulf Islands. Members' obligations to share in funding ongoing operations and any additional costs relating to capital assets are to be contributed pursuant to a Members' Agreement.
- (iv) The City is exposed to potential repayment or non-collection of property taxes received or receivable pending resolution of property assessments appealed by taxpayers. The outcome of the appeals is not reasonably estimable and repayments or non-collections, if any, will be recorded in the period that they occur. The City has allocated operating funds to reserve for future expenditures to insure against future repayments or non-collection of these taxes.

(b) Litigation liability:

There are several lawsuits pending in which the City is involved. It is considered that the potential claims against the City resulting from such litigation will be covered by insurance and not materially affect the consolidated financial statements of the City.

(c) Commitments:

(i) The City entered into a long-term contract with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for the provision of police services effective October 1, 1994. Under the terms of this contract, the City is responsible for 90% of policing costs. The 2009 estimated cost of this contract is \$3,442,000.

 - (ii) Effective for 2002, the City together with the other owners of the Juan de Fuca Recreation Complex entered into a commitment with the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society for the operation and maintenance of the facilities. Annual commitments are apportioned to each municipality based on annual municipal converted assessment values. The City's commitment for 2009 is \$1,902,096.

12. West Shore Parks and Recreation Society (the "Society"):

(a) Capital asset transfer:

The Capital Regional District (the "CRD") transferred the lands and facilities comprising the Juan de Fuca Recreation Centre to the following municipal partners (the "Municipalities") effective January 2, 2002: City of Langford, City of Colwood, District of Highlands, The District of Metchosin and the CRD (on behalf of a portion of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area).

The lands and facilities were transferred to the Municipalities in their proportionate share, as specified in the *Co-Owners' Agreement*. Future improvements are allocated among the partners as per the cost sharing formula in effect each year for each service or facility, as outlined in a *Members' Agreement*. Because the cost sharing formula in the *Members' Agreement* produces slightly different cost shares for the members from year to year, there is a gain or loss on the opening fund balances. In 2008, the City recorded a gain of \$55,802.

The repayment of the long-term debt associated with the transferred assets will continue to be a regional function, in accordance with the terms of an *Agreement to Transfer* between the CRD, the Municipalities and the Society. The debt payments are charged to the Municipalities as part of the CRD's annual requisition. The maturity dates of the various borrowings range from 2012 through 2014. The proportionate share of the debt funded by the City through the requisition process as at December 31, 2008 was \$1,989,148.

The Municipalities have each become members in the Society, which was incorporated to provide parks, recreation and community services to the Municipalities under contract. Under terms of an *Operating, Maintenance and Management Agreement*, the Society is responsible to equip, maintain and operate the facilities located at the recreation centre.

(b) Consolidation:

The City and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the plan), a jointly trusteed pension plan. The Board of Trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing the management of the pension plan, including investment of the assets and administration of the benefits. The pension plan is a multi-employer contributory pension plan. Basic pension benefits provided are defined. The plan has about 150,000 active members and approximately 54,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 32,000 contributors from local governments.

Every three years an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the plan and the adequacy of plan funding. The most recent valuation as at December 31, 2006 indicated an unfunded liability of \$438 million for basic pension benefits. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2009 with results available in 2010. The actuary does not attribute portions of the unfunded liability to individual employers. The City of Langford paid \$448,128 (2007 – \$381,319) for employer contributions to the plan in fiscal 2008.

15. Tangible capital assets:

The City is preparing for reporting on Tangible Capital Assets as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB 3150). As of December 31, 2008, the City has:

- (a) Completed an inventory of all assets owned by the City.
- (b) Created major asset categories and addressed useful life and amortization rates of asset categories.

Full financial reporting of Tangible Capital Assets in compliance with PSAB 3150 will be completed for the year ended December 31, 2008.

16. Prior period adjustment:

During 2007, the City, under the provisions of the Community Charter, borrowed available development cost charge funds for use in Roads North. The borrowing was incorrectly recorded in the 2007 financial statements, resulting in excess revenue recognition of \$1,451,792. The 2007 financial statements have been restated to remove the excess revenue which increases deferred revenue by \$1,451,792 and decreases capital funds by \$1,451,792.

17. Segmented information:

The City of Langford is a diversified municipal government institution that provides a wide range of services to its citizens, including General Government Services, Protective Services, Engineering and Public Works Services, Community Services and Utility and Enterprise Services. Service Areas were created for the purpose of recording specific activities to attain certain objectives in accordance with regulations, restrictions or limitations.

City Services are provided by departments and their activities are reported in these Service Areas. Departments disclosed in the Segmented Information, along with the services they provide are as follows:

General Government Services

The Departments within General Government Services are responsible for adopting bylaws; adopting administrative policy; levying taxes; acquiring, disposing and managing City assets; ensuring effective financial management; monitoring performance and ensuring that high quality City services standards are met.

Protective Services

The Departments within Protective Services are Policy and Bylaw Enforcement, Fire Protection and Emergency Response and Building Inspection. The mandates of these departments are to enforce laws, prevent crime and maintain peace, order and security by protecting life, property and the environment.

Engineering and Public Works

The Engineering Department is responsible for transportation services within the City of Langford.

Community Services

The Departments within Community Services include Environmental and Development Services and Recreation and Cultural Services. The Community Services Department is responsible for preparing land use plans, bylaws and policies for sustainable development of the City and for reviewing and approving new development. The Recreation and Cultural Services department is responsible for providing, facilitating the development of, and maintaining high quality parks, recreation facilities and cultural services.

Utility and Enterprise Services

This Department is responsible for administering the sewer Franchise Agreement (note 7) for the City.
