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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

2009 marked the first full year of the three-year electoral mandate given to the Council elected in December 2008. The 2009 City of Langford Council consisted of:

Mayor Stewart Young Councillor Denise Blackwell Councillor Lanny Seaton Councillor Winnie Sifert Councillor Lillian Szpak Councillor Matt Sahlstrom Councillor Roger Wade

The Standing Committee system adopted by Council just after the City incorporated has continued with the new Council. The committees benefit from the significant continuity of citizen participation, resulting in the provision of advice to council from the community. The contributions of volunteer citizens are an effective means of ensuring Langford residents are an important part of the decision-making process.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Langford continued to forge ahead with community improvements, with an emphasis on recreational and environmental initiatives. The City received a funding grant for a new Sport Complex facility which will include an ice arena and family bowling centre at City Centre Park. An artificial all-weather playing field for rugby, soccer and football - the first of its kind - was installed at City Centre Park in 2009. A second, 92,000 square foot all-weather field is expected to be completed in April of 2010.

PLANNING

Thirty-eight houses have been completed under Langford's Affordable Housing Program. An amendment to the program in 2009 allows active members of the Canadian Armed Forces posted in Victoria to qualify for the program. A number of economic stimulus initiatives, including a revitalization strategy for Sooke Highway between Jacklin and Happy Valley Roads, were enacted. A comprehensive Agricultural Strategy which included input from staff at the Agricultural Land Commission and the BC Ministry of Agriculture was presented and adopted as policy in November 2009.

ENGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS

Work on improvements to Goldstream Avenue between Bryn Maur Road and Veterans Memorial Parkway as part of the downtown beautification initiative is expected to be completed by the summer of 2010.

The Peatt/Station/Phipps/Meaford signalized intersection was completed in April 2009. The project includes a transit exchange that will become the hub of Langford's long-term commuter rail and transit strategy.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CONSTRUCTION

Langford had a good year in construction, considering the state of the global and local economy, with a total of \$97,463,825 in construction costs and 461 new residential units. It is felt that the amount of construction and economic activity that took place this past year can be attributed in large part to the economic stimulus measures undertaken by Council, including the reduction/elimination of many development-related fees and charges.

Applications: The City of Langford received 158 planning applications in 2009, 32 fewer than in 2008 and 105 fewer than 2007. Of these, Development Permits represented the greatest reduction in applications by type (-17) followed by rezoning applications (-9), Development Permit Amendments (-5) and ALR (-3). Development Variance Permit applications rose slightly (+2) in 2009, and Sign Development Permits and Official Community Plan Amendment applications remained stable.

Commercial/Business Park/Industrial Development Permits: The City of Langford issued Development Permits for approximately 4600 ft² of new commercial/business park floorspace in Langford which is considerably less than the 365,600 ft² of new commercial/business park floorspace that was approved by Development Permit in 2008. This significant decrease can be attributed to both the global economic recession and the fact that Langford issued a single Development Permit for approximately 187,000 ft² for the new SYSCO warehouse in 2008.

Multi-Family Residential Development Permits: 146 multi-family dwelling units were approved by Development Permit in 2009. This represents a 40% decline from 2008. Of the 146 multi-family dwelling units which were approved by Development Permit in 2009, 140 have commenced construction.

Agricultural Strategy: A comprehensive agrology study of the lands in Langford that are within the Agriculture Land Reserve was completed in 2007. This work was forwarded to Langford's Official Community Plan consultant and policies regarding agricultural lands were integrated into Langford's new OCP. Council established an Agricultural Advisory Committee in 2008 to consider applications for non-farming use in ALR lands and exclusion of lands from the ALR and to provide recommendations to Council with respect to agriculture and agricultural lands. A comprehensive Agricultural Strategy was developed with input from staff at the Agriculture Land Commission and the BC Ministry of Agriculture and was presented to Council and adopted as policy in November 2009.

The Agricultural Strategy discusses the ways in which Langford may acquire agricultural lands into the public trust, establish guidelines for development around designated agricultural lands, and provide a net-benefit to agriculture. Specific design guidelines for lands adjacent to agricultural lands will be developed from the Agricultural Strategy for Council's consideration in 2010.

Economic Forum: A number of new initiatives were unveiled at Langford's Economic Forum, held at Bear Mountain in January of 2009. For the Planning Department, the economic stimulus initiatives included:

- © Establish a maximum 30 day timeframe for Development Permit Process (ongoing);
- Pre-zoning of key areas in City Centre (underway);
- © Revitalization Strategy for Sooke Highway between Jacklin and Happy Valley Roads (underway);
- Deferral of Public Hearing Fees (enacted);
- Reduction of Landscape Bonding & New Timing Commitments (enacted);
- © Eliminate Happy Valley Corridor Study Reserve Fund and do not collect any fee payments required in zoning bylaw or in Sect. 219 covenant (enacted);

- Permanently subtract parent parcel from the number of lots that require amenity payments (i.e., one lot is credited for each development) or the number of lots counted towards "1 in 10" affordable units (enacted);
- Discontinue practice of charging amenity fees to affordable housing units (enacted);
- Provide, at Council's discretion, up to 10 years of tax holidays to market rental accommodations (ongoing);
- Permanently streamline variance process by amending which variances are delegated to the City Planner rather than going through formal DVP process (underway);
- © Compile a library of standard covenants and legal documents for developers to adapt for their use, as a cost saving measure and service to applicants (underway/ongoing);

Affordable Housing: To date, thirty-eight (38) affordable housing units have been constructed within Langford Affordable Housing Program. Four (4) of these affordable homes were constructed in 2009. The City of Langford amended the Affordable Housing Program 2009 to allow active members of the Canadian Armed Forces who are posted to Victoria to qualify for the affordable housing program.

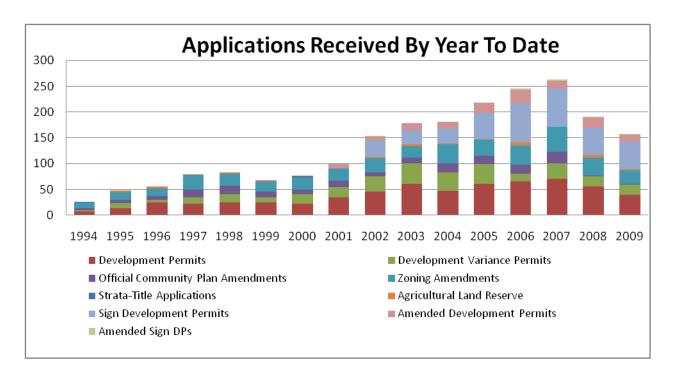
Downtown Beautification: The City of Langford added approximately \$3000 to the Downtown Beautification fund through developer contributions. As reported in last year's financial plan report, Langford has now received an exciting three-piece art installation designed by Derek Rowe (Artform Sculpture Studio) entitled "Alice" was installed this fall in front of the Goudy Public Library on Goldstream Avenue.

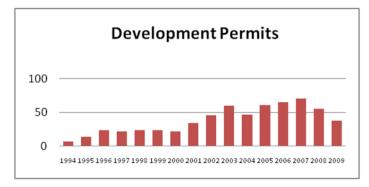

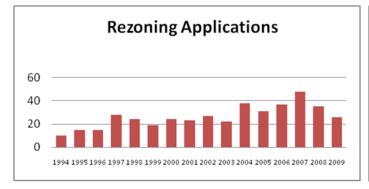


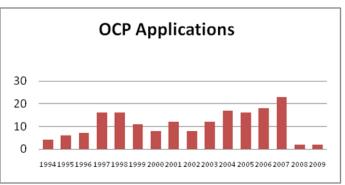


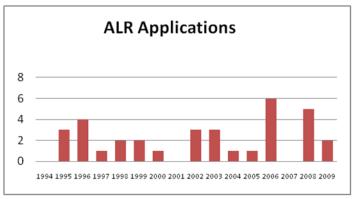












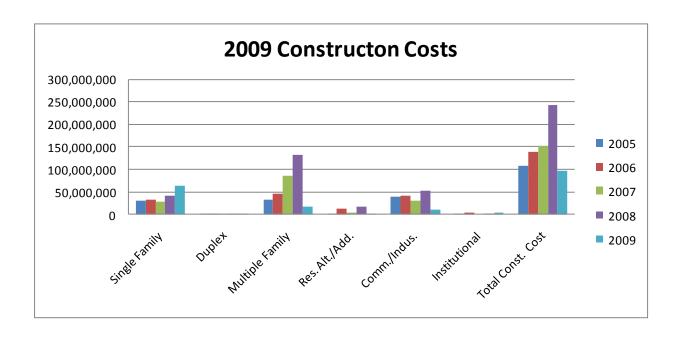
BUILDING INSPECTION DEPARTMENT

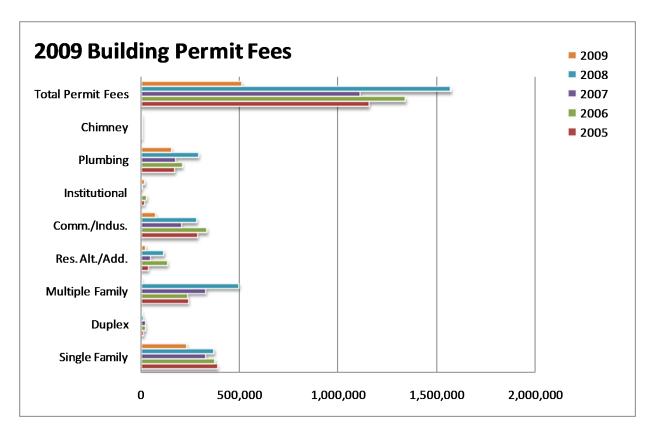
Building permit applications were low in the first two months of 2009. Permits for new single family dwellings and duplexes picked up as the year progressed; December of 2009 posted the highest number of permits issued in a single month for detached dwellings. The year end total number of permits for single family and duplexes is a new record for Langford. Permit applications for multi-family projects were virtually absent until December when Langford issued permits for 126 of the 144 units issued in 2009. Other types of permits were down slightly from the numbers posted in 2008. Permit fee numbers were affected by Langford's economic stimulus incentives launched at the beginning of February. While this incentive package included reductions of the building permit fees of up to 100%, our year end permit fee numbers were higher than the projected numbers in our 2009 budget. The incentive program ended in June.

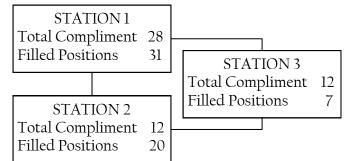

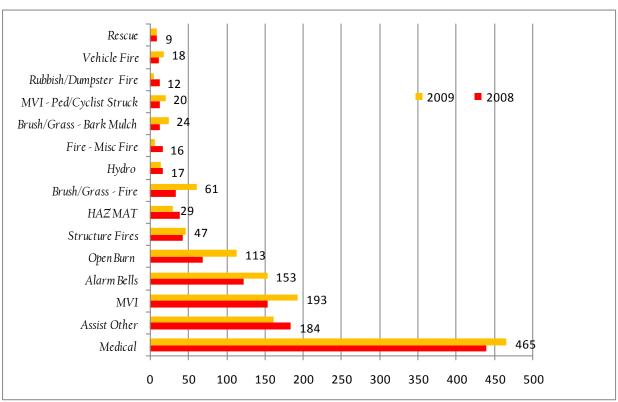

Subdivision Application and Approval Synopsis

In 2009 the City received subdivision applications to create 251 new lots and gave approval for registration to 174 new lots.

In 2009, for the year, the number of lots created through subdivision has increased from 2008.

In the 4th quarter of 2008, there was a small drop in both applications and approvals; likely a result of poor market conditions brought about by the economic recession and difficulty in borrowing. While these conditions held during the 1st and 2nd quarters of 2009, the City launched an economic stimulus package which may have helped to keep applications high for 2009, and also ensured that the number of lots created through subdivision increased from 2008.

In 2009, applications for developments north of the highway are continued to be on hold until such time that the Spencer Road Interchange is complete and operational.

For 2010, we can anticipate continued development in all lands south of the Trans Canada Highway as the Storm Drainage plan for Walfred Road, and Happy Valley have now been completed and discussed with the development community. Walfred Road area and the Happy Valley/Luxton corridor continue to be the areas of significant activity. The north side of the Trans Canada Highway continues to experience minor development as sewers extend and common properties (or properties previously used for septic disposal) become available for residential development. It is difficult to determine how much development could be anticipated on lands held by Bear Mountain, as there was little activity for the last 3 quarters of 2009.

It should be noted that the number of lots that were applied for in 2009 exceeded the number of lots registered (created) in 2009, so there is a back-log of lots pending.

Areas of Probable Subdivision Activity for 2009

Westhills – Westhills stop working on subdividing land and construction for a portion of 2008/2009, due to excellent sales figures, it is anticipated that lands will continue to move forward into subdivision.

McCormick Lands – currently in rezoning, these lands will move forward into a residential (single family homes, townhomes, and condominiums) phased subdivision in 2010.

Walfred Road – A significant amount of lands in the Walfred Road area have now completed rezoning and are ready to move forward into DP and Subdivision.

Luxton / Marwood / Happy Valley — a local concept plan has moved forward with the rezoning of a majority of parcels within this block of land. This will allow for the block to development as a single-family neighbourhood, with mixed residential uses including carriage house units, and small lots.

Sewers in the Setchfield/Treanor area continue to allow subdivisions of lands that were previously used as septic fields where current zoning allows.

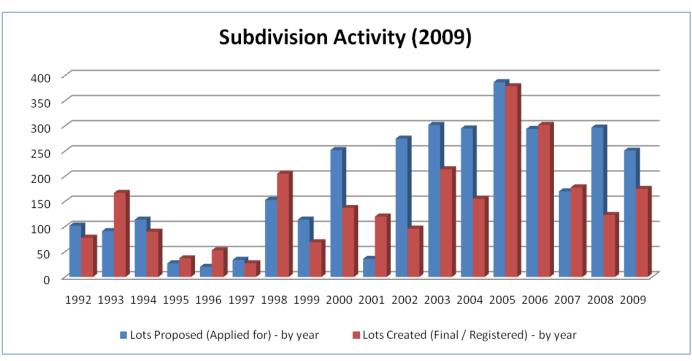

Overview

Departmental activities other than those squarely within the Community Safety Initiative continued to be tracked quantitatively throughout 2009 so that the Department, administration and Council could measure achievements of the year. Overall, 602 case files were opened in the year in the areas of land use, building, traffic, noise and other confirmed violations of City bylaws.

To ensure the highest efficiency, the department has streamlined a more stringent screening process for incoming complaints so that frivolous, retaliatory, and invalid reports would be eliminated. As in 2008, enforcement was suspended for those bylaws under revision, but in instances where an infraction of *any* bylaw



constituted a public safety hazard, action was taken immediately.



The department's foundation of complaint management continues to be the Langford tradition of prompt, in-person call response from staff.

Community Safety Officer activity continues to be tallied separately from other department work to better pinpoint achievements specific to that program.

Statistics

Figure 2 on the next page tabulates the 2009 statistical record of Bylaw Enforcement activity; the following notes provide a brief analysis of those statistics.

False Alarms: West Shore RCMP estimates that each false alarm occurring in the community



requires an hour of police officer time to deal with. Bylaw Enforcement Officers contacted every business and home owner whose system generated one or more of the 713 false alarms in 2009, to ensure that user errors and technical malfunctions were rectified, thereby preventing further false alarms.

Zoning: Enforcement of the Zoning Bylaw accounted for 137 cases; the largest number of these related to unlicenced vehicles and exposed vehicle parts on private property. These are concerns long prioritized by Council, and towards which the Bylaw Department generally works

tively. However, this category also includes cases of large and complex land use issues which absorb considerable staff time and expertise.

Traffic: As in past years, parking matters predominated in the 391 traffic files of 2009. Individual files in this tally might comprise a simple parking ticket matter or be as complex as the management and enforcement of an

entire neighbourhood's parking resources.



The delivery of bicycling regulation education, a high-volume activity, is recorded in the Community Safety statistics on following pages. The traffic tally also does not include a number of traffic stops, an enforcement method which under Council direction in 2009 continued to rank lowest in priority.



Graffiti: The files of 2009 include cases where graffiti vandals were either fined or compelled to rectify the damage. Two of the current cases are continuations from 2007 involving Langford's most prolific graffiti

vandals. A number of minor caught-in-act graffiti incidents are recorded in the CSO statistics on the following pages.

What the stats do not show: Officers perform a considerable amount of work, often daily, lending unofficial assistance when formal enforcement action is not possible. They might advise or mediate between parties, research alternative solutions, or refer callers on to other agencies that may help.

Community Safety Initiative

Overview

Langford's Community Safety and Police Support Initiative, now in its 5th year, complements and supports police services with trained and equipped Community Safety Officers (CSOs) on patrol in City streets, parks and trails. The program's mandate is to extend and augment enforcement services in the community.

CSOs fulfill their part by dealing with issues that fall squarely under City bylaws, by developing those bylaws to increased usefulness, and by applying enforcement during the day and evenings in the City. These approaches reduce some of the demand on police resources and provide a highly visible uniformed presence in the City.





In 2007 the CSOs developed a bicycle patrol function and continue to favour this method as a highly effective—not to mention 100% green--operational choice. In 2009 joint patrols with the RCMP Bike Patrol were tried and proved to be an enormously effective innovation.

Within the program, CSOs fully exercise their *peace officer status* authority established through B.C. case law. As peace officers, CSOs can apply enforcement to a wide range of undesirable activities in addition to straightforward bylaw offences. In 2009 the Community Safety Program was recognized as an exemplar of local government best practices, worthy of a Community Excellence Award from the Union of BC Municipalities.

How is it paid for?

The province's Traffic Fine Revenue Sharing Grant Program returns traffic fine net revenues to local government. Langford Council allocates about one third of the City's grant money to staff and operate the CSO program annually.

Community Safety Initiative

Statistics



Figure 1 tabulates Community Safety activity in 2009. The list is enforcement actions but also other services such as police and fire department assistance, contact with homeless persons, and crime reduction efforts. The following notes provide a brief analysis of a few key statistics.

Public Intoxication: CSOs deter the consumption of alcohol in public places--a bylaw contravention--by ensuring spirits are poured out on site. In 2009 over 1,600 units of alcohol were 'destroyed locally' this way. This work conserves police resources by preventing a considerable amount of alcohol-related public crime such as vandalism, assault, and personal injury.

Homeless contact: CSOs made contact with homeless persons in the community 180 times in 2009, primarily repeat encounters with about 12 individuals. Through contact CSOs monitor individual health and safety, garner information on community safety issues, and disrupt recurring squatter camps on vacant land.

Education and Assistance: CSOs promote voluntary compliance: for every Municipal Ticket fine imposed in 2009, officers used education and re-direction more than 33 times—a ratio identical to 2008. On average CSOs assisted the RCMP and the fire department about 29 times a month.

Monthly and annual activity is reported by CRD Animal Care Services to the Manager of Municipal Enforcement at Langford.

The contract includes management of dog licensing,

the provision of pound services, 7 -day-a-week enforcement the City's Animal Control Bylaw, and other valueadded service. For example. **CRD Animal Care** Services liaises with numerous



animal welfare and adoption agencies, to ensure the best possible chance for unwanted and un-claimed animals.



They regularly feature animals available for adoption on the CRD website.

CRD Animal Care Services also produces brochure series called "Petiquette", with help for a range of common problems animal including dog barking, bite prevention, and child safety.

The Municipal Council, acting through its Standing Committees, oversees management's responsibilities for the financial reporting and internal control systems. The Committees meet periodically with management and the external auditors to satisfy themselves that management responsibilities are properly discharged, to review the consolidated financial statements and to recommend approval of the consolidated financial statements to Council.

The consolidated financial statements have been audited by KPMG LLP, independent external auditors appointed by the City. The accompanying Auditors' Report outlines their responsibilities, the scope of their examination and their opinion on the City's consolidated financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2009

The City of Langford (the "City") is incorporated and operates under the provisions of the British Columbia Local Government Act and the Community Charter of British Columbia.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The consolidated financial statements of the City are prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for local governments as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board ("PSAB") of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant accounting policies adopted by the City are as follows:

(a) Reporting entity:

The consolidated financial statements include the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the reporting entity. The financial statements also include the City's proportionate interest in the West Shore Parks and Recreation Society ("West Shore"), an organization jointly controlled by the City. The City does not administer any trust activities on behalf of external parties.

(b) Basis of accounting:

The City follows the accrual method of accounting for revenues and expenses. Revenues are normally recognized in the year in which they are earned and measurable. Expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable as a result of receipt of goods or services and/or the creation of a legal obligation to pay.

(c) Government transfers:

Government transfers are recognized in the financial statements as revenues in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be made. Transfers received for which expenses are not yet incurred are included in deferred revenue.

(d) Deferred revenue:

Deferred revenue includes grants, contributions and other amounts received from third parties pursuant to legislation, regulation and agreement which may only be used in certain programs, in the completion of specific work, or for the purchase of tangible capital assets. In addition, certain user charges and fees are collected for which the related services have yet to be performed. Revenue is recognized in the period when the related expenses are incurred, services performed, or the tangible capital assets are acquired.

Development cost charges are amounts which are restricted by government legislation or agreement with external parties. When qualifying expenditures are incurred development cost charges are recognized as revenue in amounts which equal the associated expenses.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Year ended December 31, 2009

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(e) Investment income:

Investment income is reported as revenue in the period earned. When required by the funding government or related Act, investment income earned on deferred revenue is added to the investment and forms part of the deferred revenue balance.

(f) Cash equivalents:

Cash equivalents include short-term highly liquid investments with a term to maturity of 90 days or less at acquisition.

(g) Investments:

Investments are recorded at cost. Investments in the Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia ("MFA") Money Market Funds are recorded at cost plus earnings reinvested in the funds.

(h) Long-term debt:

Long-term debt is recorded net of related sinking fund balances.

(i) Non-financial assets:

Non-financial assets are not available to discharge existing liabilities and are held for use in the provision of services. They have useful lives extending beyond the current year and are not intended for sale in the ordinary course of operations.

(i) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost which includes amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost, less residual value, of the tangible capital assets, excluding land, are amortized on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:

- (i) Non-financial assets (continued):
 - (i) Tangible capital assets (continued)

Annual amortization is charged in the year of acquisition and in the year of disposal. Assets under construction are not amortized until the asset is available for productive use.

(ii) Contributions of tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets received as contributions are recorded at their fair value at the date of receipt and also are recorded as revenue.

(iii) Works of art and cultural and historic assets

Works of art and cultural and historic assets are not recorded as assets in these financial statements.

(iv) Interest capitalization

The City does not capitalize interest costs associated with the acquisition or construction of a tangible capital asset.

(v) Leased tangible capital assets

Leases which transfer substantially all of the benefits and risks incidental to ownership of property are accounted for as leased tangible capital assets. All other leases are accounted for as operating leases and the related payments are charged to expenses as incurred.

(vi) Inventory of supplies

Inventory of supplies held for consumption is recorded at the lower of cost and replacement cost.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(i) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Significant estimates include assumptions used in estimating provisions for accrued liabilities and in performing actuarial valuations of employee future benefits

In addition, the City's implementation of the Public Sector Accounting Handbook PS3150 has required management to make estimates of historical cost and useful lives of tangible capital assets.

Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Year ended December 31, 2009

2. Change in accounting policy:

The City has implemented PSAB sections 1200 Financial Statement Presentation and 3150 Tangible Capital Assets. Section 1200 establishes general reporting principles and standards for the disclosure of information in government financial statements. The financial statement format has been changed from prior years to comply with this standard. Section 3150 requires governments to record and amortize their tangible capital assets in their financial statements. In prior years, tangible capital asset additions were recorded as expenditures and then were set up as capital assets in the Statement of Financial Position. The capital assets were not amortized.

Methods used for determining the cost of each major category of tangible capital assets

The financial information recorded includes the actual or estimated historical cost of the tangible capital assets. When historical cost records were not available, other methods were used to estimate the costs and accumulated amortization of the assets. The City applied a consistent method of estimating the replacement or reproduction cost of the tangible capital assets for which it did not have historical cost records, except in circumstances where it could be demonstrated that a different method would provide a more accurate estimate of the cost of a particular type of tangible capital asset. After defining replacement or reproduction cost, indices including the consumer price index were used as a resource for determining appropriate indices in order to deflate the replacement or reproduction cost to an estimated historical cost at the year of acquisition.

This change has been applied retroactively and prior periods have been restated. This change in accounting policy has changed amounts reported in the prior period as follows:

(a) Assets under construction

Assets under construction having a value of \$20,080,409 (2008 - \$18,968,318) have not been amortized. Amortization of these assets will commence when the asset is put into service. Major construction contracts of \$10,200,000 were in process at December 31, 2009 with estimated costs to complete of \$5,300,000.

Included in assets under construction is \$14,818,377 for work done on the Spencer Interchange. Upon completion of the project, ownership of the portion of the interchange that is in the Trans Canada Highway right of way will be transferred to the Province of BC. At December 31, 2009 the cost of the assets to be transferred totalled \$14,278,326.

(b) Contributed tangible capital assets

Contributed tangible capital assets have been recognized at fair market value at the date of contribution. The value of contributed capital assets received during the year is \$5,144,690 (2008 - \$1,231,875) comprised of land \$3,666,710 (2008 - \$nil), sewer and storm infrastructure \$794,170 (2008 - \$nil) and roads infrastructure \$683,810 (2008 - \$1,231,875).

(c) Works of art and historical treasures

The City manages and controls various works of art and non-operational historical cultural assets including buildings, artifacts, paintings and sculptures located at City sites and public display areas. These assets are not recorded as tangible capital assets and are not amortized.

(d) Write-down of tangible capital assets

The write-down of tangible capital assets during the year was \$1,251,450 (2008 - \$nil).

7. Sewer franchise agreement:

During 2004, the City entered into a franchise and partnering agreement with West Shore Environmental Services Inc. ("WSES") and Terasen Utility Services Inc. The term of the agreement is 21 years, with a single 21 year renewal. Under the agreement, the City grants an exclusive franchise to WSES to design, construct, finance, own, operate and maintain sanitary sewers in the City. The City also grants an exemption from municipal property tax for sewer infrastructure and WSES has been granted an Order in Council to extend that exemption to property taxes for all other jurisdictions. Upon termination of the agreement, the sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES will be acquired by the City for a nominal payment.

WSES will recover its capital costs by imposition of a sewer capital recovery fee ("SCRF") on owners of property who wish to connect to the sewer. WSES will also bill and collect all user fees. Fees are frozen for five years from the implementation of the agreement. WSES will pay the City franchise fees that are estimated to total \$11 million over the 21 year term of the agreement.

The City records the costs of sewer infrastructure constructed by WSES (2009 - \$210,184) and a corresponding remaining cost to be recovered. The remaining cost to be recovered is reduced as SCRF's are collected by WSES.

The cost of WSES sewer infrastructure, less residual value, is amortized on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives, 60 to 70 years.

11. Municipal pension plan:

The City and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the "Plan"), a jointly trusteed pension plan. The Board of Trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing the management of the Plan, including investment of the assets and administration of benefits. The pension plan is a multi-employer contributory pension plan. Basic pension benefits provided are defined. The plan has about 158,000 active members and approximately 57,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 33,000 contributors from local government.

Every three years an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the Plan and the adequacy of Plan funding. The most recent valuation as at December 31, 2006 indicated a surplus of \$438 million for basic pension benefits. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2009, with results available in 2010. The actuary does not attribute portions of the surplus to individual employers. The City paid \$464,541 (2008 - \$448,128) for employer contributions to the Plan in fiscal 2009.

12. Commitments and contingencies:

(a) Contingent liabilities:

The CRD debt, under provisions of the Local Government Act, is a direct, joint and several liability of the CRD and each member municipality within the CRD, including the City of Langford.

The City is a shareholder and member of the Capital Region Emergency Service Telecommunications (CREST) Incorporated who provides centralized emergency communications, and related public safety information services to municipalities, regional districts, the provincial and federal governments and their agencies, and emergency service organizations throughout the Greater Victoria region and the Gulf Islands. Members' obligations to share in funding ongoing operations and any additional costs relating to capital assets are to be contributed pursuant to a *Members' Agreement*.

The City may be subject to potential repayment or non-collection of property taxes received or receivable pending resolution of property assessments appealed by taxpayers. The outcome of the appeals is not reasonably estimable and repayments or non-collections, if any, will be recorded in the period that they occur. The City has allocated operating funds to reserve for future expenses to insure against future repayments or non-collection of these taxes

(b) Municipal Finance Authority contingent demand notes:

Under borrowing arrangements with the MFA, the City is required to lodge security by means of demand notes and interest-bearing cash deposits based on the amount of the borrowing. As a condition of these borrowings, a portion of the debenture proceeds is withheld by the MFA as a debt reserve fund. These deposits are included in the City's financial assets as other assets and are held by the MFA as security against the possibility of debt repayment default. If the debt is repaid without default, the deposits are refunded to the City. At December 31, 2009 there were contingent demand notes of \$156,901 which are not included in the financial statements of the City.

(c) Litigation liability:

There are several lawsuits pending in which the City is involved. It is considered that the potential claims against the City resulting from such litigation will be covered by insurance and not materially affect the consolidated financial statements of the City.

12. Commitments and contingencies (continued):

(d) Commitments:

The City entered into a long-term contract with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for the provision of police services effective October 1, 1994. Under the terms of this contract, the City is responsible for 90% of policing costs. The 2010 estimated cost of this contract is \$3,617,000.

13. Budget data:

The unaudited budget data presented in these consolidated financial statements is based upon the 2009 operating and capital budgets approved by Council on May 11, 2009. Amortization was not contemplated on development of the budget and, as such, has not been included. 14. West Shore Parks and Recreation Society:

(a) Capital asset transfer:

The Capital Regional District (the "CRD") transferred the lands and facilities comprising the Juan de Fuca Recreation Centre to the following municipal members (the "Municipalities") effective January 2, 2002: City of Langford, City of Colwood, District of Highlands, District of Metchosin and the CRD (on behalf of a portion of the Juan de Fuca Electoral Area). Effective January 1, 2007 the Town of View Royal became a member of the Society.

In 2002 the lands and facilities were transferred to the Municipalities in their proportionate share, as specified in the Co-Owners' Agreement. The lands and facilities were reallocated amongst the members on January 1, 2007 when the Town of View Royal became a member. Future improvements are allocated among the members as per the cost sharing formula in effect each year for each service or facility, as outlined in a Members' Agreement. For 2009, the City's share of improvements purchased by the Society on its behalf is \$265,427.

Because the cost sharing formula in the Members' Agreement produces different cost shares for the members from year-to-year, there is a gain or loss on the opening fund balances. In 2009, the City recorded a gain of \$703,210.

The repayment of the long-term debt associated with the transferred assets will continue to be a regional function, in accordance with the terms of an Agreement to Transfer between the CRD, the Municipalities and the Society. The debt payments are charged to the Municipalities as part of the CRD's annual requisition. The maturity dates of the various borrowings range from 2012 through 2014. The proportionate share of the debt funded by the City through the requisition process as at December 31, 2009 was \$1,525,000.

The Municipalities have each become members in the Society, which was incorporated to provide parks, recreation and community services to the Municipalities under contract. Under terms of an Operating, Maintenance and Management Agreement, the Society is responsible to equip, maintain, manage and operate the facilities located at the recreation centre.

(b) Consolidation:

Financial results and budget for the Society are consolidated into the City's financial statements proportionately, based on the cost sharing formula outlined in the Members' Agreement. In 2009, the City's proportion for consolidation purposes was 46.677% (2008 - 45.23%).

15. Segmented information:

The City is a diversified municipal government institution that provides a wide range of services to its citizens, including General Government Services, Protective Services, Engineering and Public Works Services, Community Services and Utility and Enterprise Services. Service Areas were created for the purpose of recording specific activities to attain certain objectives in accordance with regulations, restrictions or limitations

City services are provided by departments and their activities are reported in these Service Areas. Departments disclosed in the Segmented Information, along with the services they provide are as follows:

General Government Services

The Departments within General Government Services are responsible for adopting bylaws; adopting administrative policy; levying taxes; acquiring, disposing and managing City assets; ensuring effective financial management; monitoring performance and ensuring that high quality City services standards are met.

Protective Services

The Departments within Protective Services are Police and Bylaw Enforcement; Fire Protection and Emergency Response; and Building Inspection. The mandates of these departments are to enforce laws, prevent crime, maintain peace, order and security by protecting life, property and the environment.

Engineering and Public Works

The Engineering Department is responsible for the transportation services with the City.

Community Services

The Departments within Community Services include Environmental and Development Services and Recreation and Cultural Services. The Environmental and Development Services Department is responsible for preparing land use plans, bylaws and policies for sustainable development of the City and for reviewing and approving new development. The Recreation and Cultural Services Department is responsible for providing, facilitating the development of, and maintaining high quality parks, recreation facilities and cultural services.

Utility and Enterprise Services

This Department is responsible for administering the Sewer Franchise Agreement (note 7) for the City.

The accounting policies used in these segments are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the financial statements. The following table provides additional financial information for the foregoing segments.
